CONFINED ABEYED BY LUMBAGO

In Pain for Weeks

Acting on his principle of "when you know a good thing tell your friends about it," a man who has had very bad lumbago pains writes as follows:—

"I suffered from lumbago, and for several weeks nearly more or less bed. I had treatment, but it did not ease the pain very much.

—There is however, one way I feel the government might offer assistance in placing some young men on vacant farms.

—Brighter Prospects The year 1938 has brought its difficulties, its failures, and its encouragements, and possibly the rank and file of our farming population are in about the same mental circumstances as we found them last year.

—We have in our province a large majority of farmers who are producing and making a reasonable success financially and otherwise, while others are falling.

—I am forced to believe that in a great many cases our farmers have taken life too easy. They are not giving reasonable service.

—They have tried to their sorrow to speculate and hibernate. They specialize in the summer on a cash crop and keep so little livestock that they can almost hibernate in the winter.

—They at least follow a system of feeding the things, as they say, between eight and nine in the morning, cleaning out the stables at least every two or three days, backing a little wood at the door, and feeding again at four in the evening, and another day is complete. Under such conditions, we usually find the live stock both old and hungry.

—In many cases, of course, our farmers have become discouraged. They see their schoolmates who have moved to the city driving around in a big car, and enjoying all the luxuries of life, which they (the farmers) cannot afford, and they just rebel in their minds, lose interest and quit.

—There is only one system for the farmers of Prince Edward Island to follow, and that is mixed farming. By this I mean carrying live stock to the full capacity of the farm and looking after it in a decent manner.

—Now you will say that this is an old story. It is, but we are not talking our occupation with intelligence and determination.

—There are of course many cases where young men have begun under an accumulated debt, and under a poor price, and the interest rate too high, they could not possibly provide for the needs of their family without becoming fur-
