ITS LAWFUL CIRCULATION WAS EXCEEDED

Strange Mistake of Bank in April Last. Many Have to Pay Fine. Special to The Guardian. OTTAWA, June 15—By inadvertence the Bank of Nova Scotia exceeded by some \$30,000 the circulation allowed by the banking act last April and is now liable to the penalty provided.

The excess circulation was only issued for one day and the attention of the Finance Department was immediately called to it by the general manager. The Treasury Board now has the matter under consideration and the fine imposed will probably be about \$10,000.

BOSTON, June 14—A plea of guilty was offered in the midst of his testimony in the United States district court today by Rev. Norman Plass, former president of the Redeemable Investment Company, who was on trial for using the mails in furtherance of a fraudulent scheme. Charles H. Brooks, the president, and John I. Traphegan, the assistant treasurer, pleaded guilty to "technical" fraud. All three will be fined instead of imprisoned, it is understood.

LED FORCE TO QUELL RIOT

NEW YORK, June 14—The news spread from station to station and from rank to rank of the police department last night that Rhinelander Waldo, newly appointed commissioner, had "made good" as an active officer. At the head of a flying wedge he rushed into a crowd of several hundred foreigners on the East Side last night to the relief of a patrolman who was struggling to arrest a man charged with assault. The commissioner was visiting an East Side police station when a wagon driver rushed in breathlessly with the report that a man had shot three times at him at a couple of streets below. The commissioner was the first to dash out of the station. When he had reserves who followed him gained the vortex of the crowd they surrounded Policeman Cordenell, who was struggling with the alleged assailant, Louis Zeus, and marched the man to the station house. The driving of the commissioner, as he waded into the mass of foreigners, brushing them aside or punching with his bare fists many who showed fight, was a surprise to the bluecoats, who afterward applauded him warmly.

India Having Record Crop and Canada Larger Area Sown Than Before. YEAR OF PLENTY.

WASHINGTON, June 15—A bumper harvest of wheat in British India, estimated at 329,000,000 bushels and surpassing all previous yields, and a record area sown to spring wheat in Western Canada, where ninety per cent. of the Dominion wheat is grown, giving rise to a seemingly extra yield against the estimates of probable yield, are features of the World's Review of May Agricultural News, and was announced by the United States Department of Agriculture today.

BIGGEST BANK IN UNITED STATES NOW IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, June 14—The Continental and Commercial National Bank has become the largest bank in the United States as to resources, by taking over the Hibernian Bank. The total assets of the bank are \$255,000,000. The total deposits of the consolidated banks reach \$225,270,290. Since 1907 the Continental National and the Commercial National, which merged last winter, have taken over the International, the Globe National, the National of North America and the American Trust and Savings banks.

A POSER FOR STEEL TRUST OFFICIAL

WASHINGTON, June 14—Determined to discover why the United States Steel Corporation could sell rails abroad cheaper than at home, the "steel trust" investigating committee of the house today practically announced its intention of summoning James A. Farrell, president of the corporation, to explain the situation. James Gabley, former vice-president of the corporation, acknowledged he could not tell and referred the committee to Mr. Farrell, who for years had been in charge of the export business of the concern.
