Believed in New York Miss MacDonald Was Hurt by German Alimen.

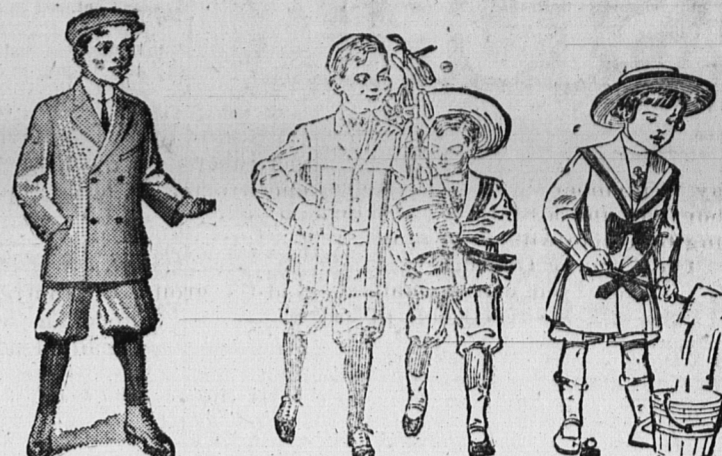

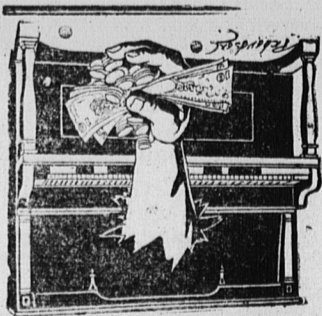

NERVES Nerves are the real or imaginary evil of almost every woman's life. It is doubtful which sort is worse to possess. The fancied kind can be cured by will power, but the real ones require a more devious method of cure. There are two splendid things to do to overcome a nervous condition. One is eat, the other, sleep. Fat people are never nervous, big eaters are seldom nervous. When there is food in the stomach, the blood is drawn down from the brain, and, for a time at least, the nerves are quiet. And gradually sufficient good food will build up the system.
