THE CAPITAL OF THE WEST

Latest From Summerside and Prince County.

A Furious Fire Yesterday Destroyed Dwelling and Barn—A Reported Drowning Accident.

POTATOES are now down to 30 cents in Summerside.

Miss Joseph Lewis of this town is seriously ill of pneumonia.

Leonard McDowell son of David McDowell is ill with a severe attack of inflammation.

THERE were about 1,400 bags potatoes included in the cargo by the Northumberland yesterday.

E. P. Stavert, St. John who so narrowly escaped drowning a few days ago intends leaving today for Europe to recuperate.

U. C. GARDINER and Mrs. Gardiner were passengers of the Northumberland last evening returning from California and Florida.

MRS. CALVIN HOWATT and Mrs. Russell Howatt, Tryon, spent a few days last week visiting in Summerside the guests Mrs. W. S. Steeves.

Miss Blanche Grady left yesterday for Poplar Point, Manitoba to visit her brother H. H. Grady. She will return the latter part of June in company with Mrs. H. H. Grady.

W. E. Jardine, teller of the Summerside Branch of the Bank of New Brunswick has been called to St. John and will leave for that city in a day or two. He will be succeeded here by James McKinnon.

A REPORT reached Summerside last night that a drowning accident had happened yesterday on the North Shore by which a man named Best lost his life but up to a late hour last night no particulars could be obtained.

DR. THOMAS ROBERTSON, was last evening tendered a farewell supper by his Masonic brethren in the restaurant of Misses Reid and Ross. A very pleasant evening was spent. Dr. Robertson leaves shortly for the North West.

MATTHEW MCFARLANE of this town, having been appointed by the Government as inspector of stations now being built on the Murray Harbor Branch Railway, is at present working there and will be absent from Summerside all summer.

The dwelling house of Adrian McLure, and the barn and outbuildings of Mr. Pritchard, Linkletter Road, were destroyed by fire yesterday afternoon. The fire started in Mr. McLure's dwelling originating from a spark from the flue. The wind was blowing a gale and the house was soon burned to the ground with nearly all its contents including \$50 in cash. The burning debris ignited Mr. Pritchard's barn some distance away which was quickly reduced to ashes together with a quantity of oats contained therein. Mr. Pritchard's house was saved through the efforts of neighbors who carried water from a windmill pump of Mr. Callbeck's near by.

A LITTLE sparrow was caught by the feet between the twisted strands of a barbed wire fence on the railway line in a western section of the province a day or two ago, struggling for life. Without voice to call for assistance and minus the power to extricate itself from the dangerous position in which by accident it had been placed, the little bird had fought with death until all the toes of one foot had been lacerated, and was hanging in a half-dead-and-alive condition, flapping its wings until the poor bird had become exhausted almost beyond life's endurance. Nothing short of a miracle seemed to be its salvation. So insignificant was the diminutive bird that none could have noticed it in its agony had not the train from Tignish stopped between stations, right alongside the spot, to take in water; and as it happened, a doctor was on board who by chance observed the helpless bird in its predicament. The sympathetic physician jumped from his seat; and, as he "whooses with equal eye, as God of all, a hero perish, or a sparrow fall," rushed out of the car and released the sufferer and after examining its condition gave it that freedom which none perhaps appreciate more than the birds of the air.

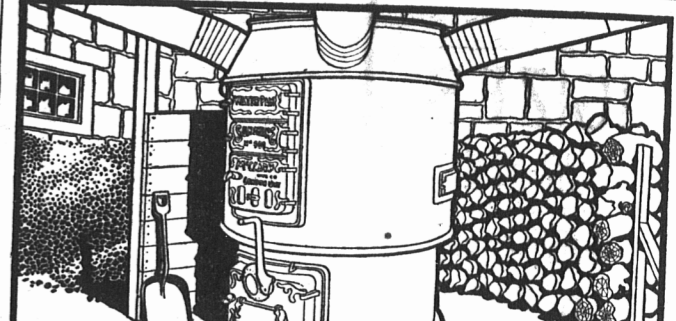

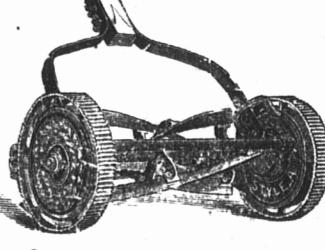
