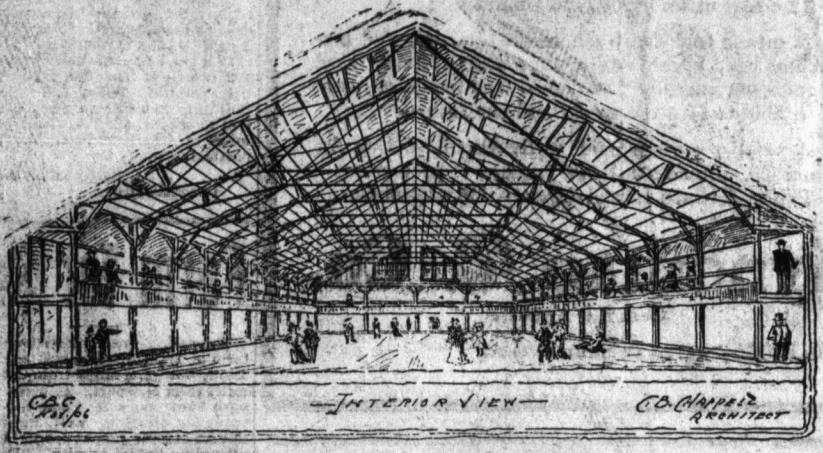

THE DISASTER AT WASHINGTON

Totals Forty Killed, Fifty Injured—Engineer Says Could Not See Signals On Account of Fog—His Train Running Fifty to Sixty Miles an Hour.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 1 (Special).—The total number of killed in the rear end collision on the Baltimore and Ohio Railway at Terra Cotta, D. C. a block station three miles from Washington Sunday night, is estimated at about 40 and the number of injured at 50. The wreck was caused by an engine drawing 80 empty cars tumbling into a local known as the Frederick Express, just as the passenger train had pulled out from the station bound for this city. Engineer Hildebrand, who was in charge of the dead train and who was arrested shortly after the disaster, declared that on account of the dense fog he was unable to distinguish the signal light at Takoma Park Block Station Tower. Operator Phillips declares that the danger signal was in its proper place and that Engineer Hildebrand's train passed the tower station going at a speed of from 50 to 60 miles an hour.

M.P.A.A.A. BULLETIN FOR NEW GLASGOW

Declares That All Members Who played For Stanley Cup Are Professional

HALIFAX, Jan. 1.—(Special).—An M. P. A. A. Bulletin issued today declares professionals all those who played for New Glasgow at Montreal. Under the constitution the New Glasgow A. A. A. is suspended for violating the rules of the Association.

THE QUEER STORY OF A DOCTOR

LONDON Jan 2.—A remarkable story of vicissitude was recently told in the Liverpool England bankruptcy court by Dr. John Eustace, a surgeon, whose last practice had been in Widnes and who presented himself for public examination. He had practised in Persia, East and South Africa he said, and in the summer of 1903 he went to Widnes, where he obtained employment in a foundry as a laborer. Suffering from ague three times a week regularly he felt himself to be entirely broken down in health and unfit for practice. Moreover, he thought physical labor was the best thing he could go on with for a time.

How he emerged from a laborer's state was also a remarkable story. An accident had happened at the works by which a man's arm was broken. The bankrupt came forward and set the limb in such a style that when the injured man was taken to the hospital it was discovered that a practised hand had been at work. Inquiries were made with the result that the bankrupt, who had worked at the foundry under an assumed name, was revealed as a qualified doctor and was encouraged to start practice.

Charles R. Devlin Defeats the Conservative Candidate by 391

MONTREAL, Jan. 1.—(Special).—Corrected return show that C. R. Devlin, Liberal had majority of 700 in the district in which he led and Ball, Conservative, had a majority of 270 in the other district. This gives Mr. Devlin the handsome majority of 430. WINNIPEG, Jan. 1.—(Special).—Manitoba Legislature will open on Thursday for its last session. It is expected the session will be very short, although there will probably be held a debate on the telephone question. It is also expected that the question of the Manitoba boundary will play an important part and the Roblin Government may endeavor to take some action to force the hand of the Dominion Authorities. The session is slated on the best authority, will be followed in March by a general election.

WOMAN FATALLY BURNED BY GAS

Explosion Also Wrecked House and Moved it on Foundation.

BRANTFORD, Ont., Jan 1 (Special).—Mrs Howie an elderly lady residing on Dundas Street received fatal burns in a gas explosion. She had gone to the pantry carrying a lighted lamp and as she opened the door a terrible explosion resulted which moved the house off its foundation and inflicted frightful burns to the woman's head and shoulders. The interior of the house is completely wrecked.

CANADIAN TRADE STILL BOOMING

Increase in Five Months is Forty-four Millions Over Last Year.

OTTAWA, Jan 1 (Special).—For the first five months of the present fiscal year Canada's trade was two hundred and seventy-eight and a half millions, an increase of forty-four millions over last year. Dominion produce was exported to the extent of over a hundred and fifteen millions, being three and a half millions greater than last year.

PREMIER WILL NOT LIKELY RECOVER

In Evnt Of Scott's Death Attorney General Lamont Will Lead.

HEALTH, December 31.—There was a slight improvement in Premier Scott's condition last night, but it is still doubtful and he is not expected to recover. Naturally a frail man, the work of the last campaign and the effort to settle the coal strike have sapped his remaining vitality and pneumonia found him an easy victim. A political crisis is not anticipated, however, as Attorney-General Lamont is expected to take the leadership of the liberal forces in the event of the premier's death. He has been close to his confidence and the government is strong enough to stand even the death of the premier, though it is unquestionably a very strong factor.

OTTAWA, Dec. 31.—The Mounted Police have advised the Ottawa authorities that a family living at Cheyenne, Wyoming, and calling themselves Adam, the Second, and Eve, the Second, with their son, Lee Adam, contemplates emigrating with a party of thirty-one persons to Western Canada in the spring to proclaim that they are the Messiah, Adam, the Second says that he saw a star fall and he felt that he was the Messiah. Secretary of State Root, Secretary of War Taft, Secretary of the Navy Mitchell and associate Supreme Court Justice Moody paid Sir Mortimer an unusual compliment by coining to the Railway station and joining with the members of the diplomatic corps in saying good-bye to the Ambassador and his family.

New York, Jan 1.—(Special).—Charles Evans Hughes was today sworn in as Governor of New York State.

558 ARRESTS IN ST. PETERSBURG

Of that Number 34 are Women—Police Active to Resist Attempt

St. Petersburg, Dec. 18.—The secret police made 558 arrests here during the last three days. The prisoners include 34 women, charged with "Revolutionary Activity and Illegal Election Agitation." Further arrests and searches are proceeding vigorously. The activity on the part of the police is due to the recent attempts of the life of Vice Admiral Doubovoff, ex-governor of Moscow, and the assassination of General Count Alexis Igratieff a Tver, resulting from the determination of the revolutionists to obtain the revenge their former decision to abstain from acts of terrorism during electoral campaign.

DEVLIN'S VOTE WAS HANDSOME

He Led Ball Conservative, by 490 Majority in Nicolet County

BRANTFORD, Nicolet County, Quebec, Dec. 29.—Charles R. Devlin, Liberal, was today elected a member of parliament for the County of Nicolet, defeating George Ball, the Conservative candidate by a majority of 391. Mr. Devlin was given 101 votes as follows in the polls here named: St. Angèle, 52; St. Gervaise, 39; St. Leonard, 88; St. Monique, 4; Manson, 83; Brecheux, 41; Gentilly, 9; St. Pierre, 128; Brantford, 78; St. Sophie, 9; Ste. Marie, 44. Mr. Ball received majorities as follows in six parishes, viz: Nicolet, 21; Ste. Brigitte, 51; St. Samuel, 3; St. Gertrude, 28; St. Sylvere, 9; St. Winceslas, 19; St. Lulalie, 14; St. Perpetue, 101. Majority for Mr. Devlin, 391.
