Crapaud-Victoria Trade Bd. Meeting

The regular meeting of the Crapaud-Victoria Board of Trade was held recently. The vice-president, Robert Dawson, was in the chair. He made appropriate reference to the passing of our late president, Spurgeon Clark. The members of the Board rose and observed a minute of silence in his memory.

The Road Committee reported that a delegation from the Board had waited on Hon. Mr. Barbour and the members of the Provincial Government concerning improvement on highways.

Mr. Barbour stated that he would get in touch with the authorities in Ottawa and see what action they were taking in the matter.

A subsequent letter from him informed the Board that no legislation was put through for the Federal Government to provide money for the Trans-Canada Highway this season.

Mr. Brenton Wood was appointed to represent the Board and discuss problems when the Royal Commission on transportation meets in Charlottetown in July.

It was decided that the Board go to Ottawa to personally request the Department of Highways to continue widening and grading the Augustus Cove Road to Abiteau Bridge this year.

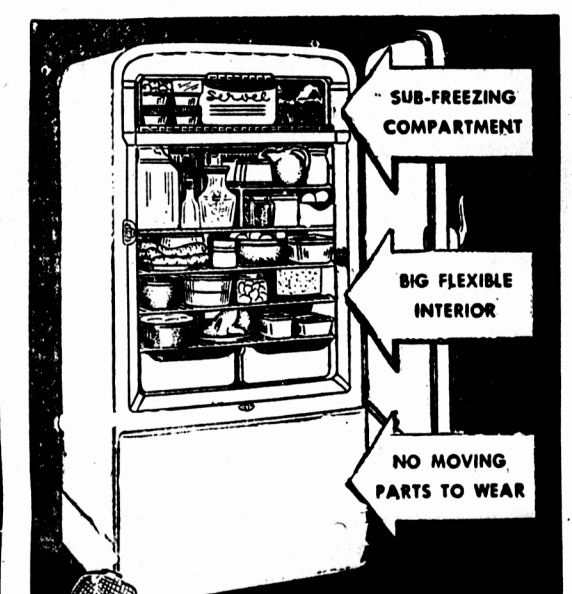
