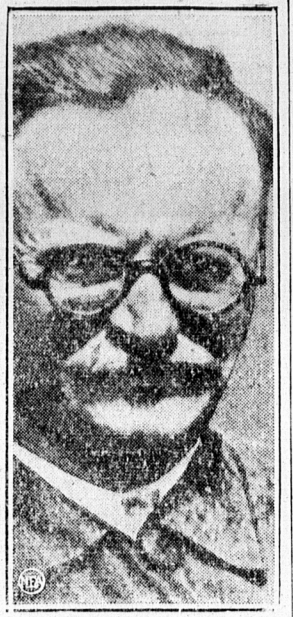

**Early Days Spent in Choir Valuable**

**BOYS' CHARACTER INFLUENCED BY ASSOCIATION WITH CATHEDRALS AND CHURCHES**  
 Cathedral bodies are taking great thought and trouble with the education of the choristers and very few boys fail to pass the qualifying examinations to certain public schools and secure boys obtain scholarships. Ernest Bullock, organist and master of the choristers of Westminster Abbey, states.  
 "The religious and historical associations of our great cathedrals and collegiate churches cannot fail to have a marked influence on a boy's character during the most impressionable years of his life," he writes in The Churchman's Handbook. "It may not always be fully realized at the time, but over and over again experience has proved that a lasting good has been wrought by this early association. The value of the liturgical daily offices from a religious and cultural point of view cannot be estimated. And, apart from religion, each cathedral can provide its own particular historical and architectural interests. We at the Abbey are especially fortunate in this respect, having practically the whole of the history of England within the walls of this ancient church."  
 "Many of the cathedral choir schools in England are of ancient foundation. Song schools, as they were called, were set up in the earliest days of the Roman mission, and in the sixth and seventh centuries much good work was being done. Before the Reformation, not only monasteries and cathedrals had song schools, but others were maintained by the King for the Chapel Royal and by the great ecclesiastics and nobles.

**The Song School**  
 "The prevalence of the song school made it possible for England to be a nation of musicians in the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries," writes Dr. Frere, "but few survived the reformation, except in connection with great collegiate or cathedral churches, and England lost its skill." These are very significant words; and though the loss of the greater number of these song schools is to be deplored, yet happily some have survived and have been the musical nurseries of many English musicians, including one of the greatest, Henry Purcell.

**Cabbages are Kings in Ohio**  
 An unusual scene, in a year of catastrophic drought, is this of two exultant farmers in lush cabbage fields. But, still more odd, the drought itself is responsible for their glee. During one afternoon, Harold Davis, left, and William Smith of West Liberty, O., picked a wagonload of cabbages that brought them \$300 cash at the farm gate. Other northwestern Ohio farmers, amazed at their luck, are getting as high as \$600 an acre for cabbages, at prices forced up by the dry spell. Last year they averaged \$20 an acre.

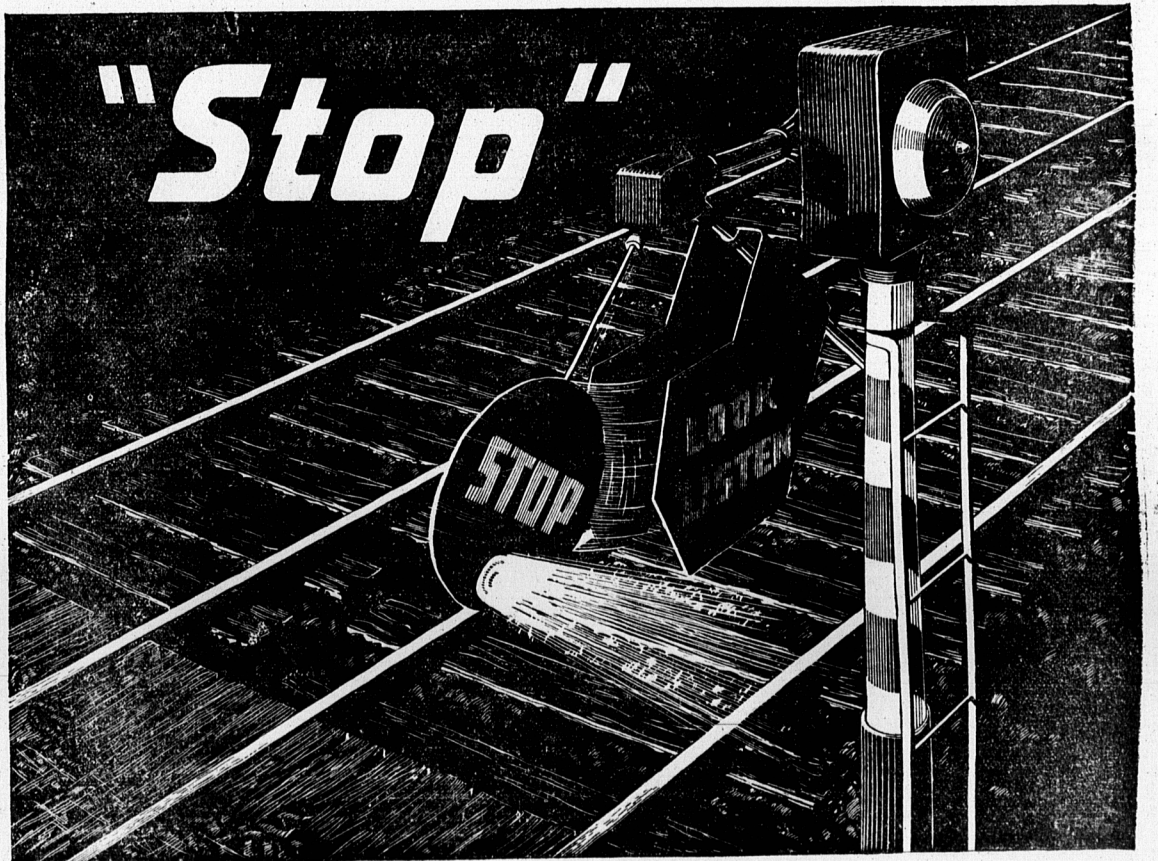
