IN MEMORIAM

M. A. NICHOLSON

There passed peacefully away, at his home at Commercial Cross, Kings County, on Sunday evening, July 11th, 1943, Murdoch A. Nicholson, known to his friends and acquaintances more familiarly as "Murt" Nicholson, in the 41st year of his age.

On the death of his father, a few years ago, Murt came into possession of the homestead, one of the finest and best equipped farmsteads in that part of the province, and it appeared as if there lay before him the possibility of a long and usual life under most congenial circumstances. He thus assumed his enlarged responsibilities with cheerfulness and enthusiasm, little knowing that inexorable Fate had other plans in store; that he would soon—all too soon—be called upon to face and grapple with.

About a year ago he went through a serious operation and while his progress towards recovery was a calm cheerfulness that continued with him until the end. During his illness he was visited regularly by his Pastor, Rev. Mr. Fraser, of Valleyfield, who spoke to him words of comfort and hope for the future, and to whom the deceased professed faith in God upon whom he had commended his spirit.

The late Murt Nicholson was an only son of the late A. M. Nicholson and his wife Cassie MacDonald (Nicholson)—a daughter of the late Archibald MacDonald of Brooklin Lot 61—and leaves to mourn his untimely passing, an ageing mother and one sister, Mrs. Elvin Chesness of Los Angeles, California.

Besides, there are many closely connected relatives, and some more remote, and a host of friends and acquaintances who will grieve over his untimely passing. They join in sincere sympathy with the mother who was called upon to part with an only son, upon whom she had hoped to rely for support during her declining years. Also, she only sister, who self-sacrificingly left the comforts of her home in far away California and journeyed to this Province in the heart of winter, so that she might help in caring for an ailing brother. The funeral service was held at his late residence at Commercial Cross on Tuesday afternoon July 6th and was conducted by the Rev. J. Milton Fraser of Valleyfield, who spoke words of consolation to the bereaved family, as well as the large number of relatives and friends assembled to pay a last tribute to the departed. CRIB CONSTRUCTION CARRIED ON—Workmen of the Island Building Company are engaged in building cribs to be used in oil boring operations in Hillsboro Bay. At the drilling position a crib, 48 by 48 feet has been placed and work is being done on erecting one of 56 feet. The building of a crib 48 by 72 feet will complete the work. Completion of the cribs takes place at the scene of operations where an upper portion is added, and the whole filled with stone and concrete and sunk. Boring operations commence after the cribs have been built on the powerful derricks lift the large timbers into place over the side, while workmen with drills, operated by compressed air, make the timbers ready for the long rods which hold them securely in position. A large number of men are being employed, each having his particular work.

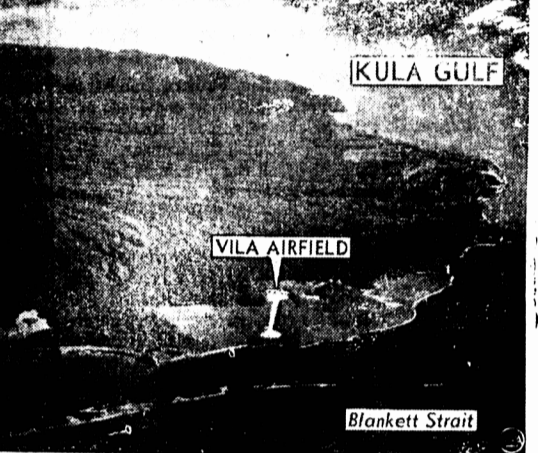

NOTICE

BY-LAW TO AMEND THE BY-LAW TO REGULATE TRAFFIC IN THE CITY OF CHARLOTTETOWN

Be IT ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:

The By-law to regulate traffic in the City of Charlottetown is hereby amended by adding to Section 58 thereof of the following:

'The said Committee is further empowered and authorized to set up slow signs at any street intersection and maintain the same as long as said Committee may think fit, all of which slow signs shall be clearly indicated by printed lettering so placed that it may be read by the drivers or operators of the approaching vehicles which are intended to be slowed; No vehicle confronted by such slow sign shall enter upon such intersection without having materially reduced its speed below that ordinarily allowable at an intersection, and every such vehicle shall delay entering upon such intersection, even to the extent of completely stopping, until such entry can safely be effected without interfering with traffic on or nearly approaching the intersection or with foot traffic thereat; provided always that vehicles entering such intersection from approaches not confronting them with a slow sign (or with a stop sign) shall not hereby, or by Sections 56 or 57 of this By-law or by any sign placed under Section 56 be relieved from the requirements of this By-law limiting speed at intersection.'
