TO FOX BREEDERS

Sir:—You have read the story of Esau who, when he was hungry, sold his birthright for a mess of pottage, and was thereby 'jewed out' of his inheritance.
The same methods are being pursued all over Prince Edward Island today by unscrupulous men who realize that some fox breeders are in a tight place financially, and who are taking advantage of the situation in order to get good foxes for nothing.
Because you are not sufficiently informed on the value of your breeding animals, from the standpoint of furs, you are allowing people to pull the wool over your eyes and then take good money out of your pockets.
Many people outside of this Province are buying more foxes than ever before and many of them are pursuing the following methods: A man told me on the streets of Summerside the other day that he was going around telling the G. D. farmers that the fox business was no good, and after discouraging them all he possibly can, he offers to buy their foxes at about one-fifth of what they are actually worth.
All kinds of false reports are in circulation, regarding the prices at which prominent fox men are selling foxes, in order to persuade you to give up your foxes for nothing, or next thing to it.
Fox meetings were held all over the Island and the majority of the breeders of standard bred pure P. E. Island foxes agreed not to take less than \$4000 per pair for foxes this year, and most of the responsible concerns that I know of are keeping that agreement. None of the Rayner organizations have offered a pair of foxes for less than \$4,000 per pair, and personally I have yet to sell the first pair of Rayner foxes for less than \$10,000, though I will have to do it this year. There is a growing demand for foxes of recognized quality and productiveness and if fox men who have high grade P. E. Island foxes will stick to the price agreed upon, just as many patriots will be sold, and the business greatly helped. Of course, there are a lot of foxes that would be dear at any price; but every man who owns pure bred P. E. Island foxes of the best strains is giving away his birthright when he sells them for less than \$4,000 per pair. When high grade foxes are sold at sacrifice prices we are making the hardest kind of competition for ourselves by giving the men who buy at extremely low prices, a chance to compete with us who bought at the high prices, thus enabling them to undersell us both for live stock and pelts, and make good money where we starve. It is better to kill a few foxes and sell their pelts to pay running expenses, than to sell live animals for breeding purposes for a small fraction of what they are worth. Let us keep in touch with one another and do not believe all the stories circulated by those who want to get your foxes away from you for a song, and then go around laughing and bragging about how they "took the d—d farmers' money."
I believe that there is untold wealth in the fox business if we have the Grit and Courage to hold on to our foxes, unless we get our price.

BLACK VELVET IN VOGUE FOR HATS

An exclusive showing of fall hats reveals the fact that black velvet in many new and unusual shapes, flower trimmed, will be the leader of early fall. The trimming is low, forming floral wreaths about the crown, the height being in the odd shaping of the hats. They are considerably larger than the hats of mid-summer.

One rather striking hat has a medium crown with a flaring fluted brim, one large white pond lily at a little to the left of the front lying partly on the brim. The hat is faced with soft apple green velvet. A most becoming hat this for the red-haired girl. A sort of zebra hat is made of alternate folds of black and white velvet around the crown and brim, faced with poppy pink velvet and having a big silk velvet poppy of the same shade laid on the front of the brim. The brim turns slightly up at the left and down at the right side.

Quite a selection is shown in all-black models, some of them in stunning continental shapes with the cockades of coque feathers. This is always a pleasant fashion revival. Some have the feather papoose with a curled quill stem ascending from the center that has become familiar to us on this summer's hats.

One striking poke bonnet has a stiffened black crown, which is transparent, and a black velvet brim. Three black tips are bunched at the side and two long ties of satin ribbon fall from a square tailored bow at the back well down on to the coat. A tiny banding of ostrich feathers finishes the edge of the hat brim, which is also faced with black velvet.

Like men, women are now considering the comfort of their hats. While they do not go so far as men do in having them weighed, so that the summer straw shall weigh less than the 12-ounce winter slouch hat, they must have them light in order not to disarrange the hair; for now that it is obligatory to almost all places of amusement for women to remove their hats it is quite necessary that the arrangement of the hair underneath shall not be crushed and flattened by too heavy a hat.

WOMEN IN FRANCE.

Owing to the war, women in England and France are taking up the old callings to make up for the shortage of men, but in the country women have always done whatever lies nearest to their hands.
In the village, the butcher, the baker, the candlestick maker, may all be women, and there is at least one small town in Devon in which women form the chief business element. The principal hotel is run by a woman and her daughter; a woman deftly cuts the joints and orders her son about.

The bakeress bakes the nicest bread, and her daughter trudges far into the country with two baskets slung on her back, a picturesque figure of a female worker. The wine merchant is a woman who worked up a nice little business, while a chemist's shop is owned by a woman, to say nothing of the trades which are to be found everywhere, sweetstuff shops, fancy shops and the like.

France being a country where universal service is the rule, is nowadays depending largely on the work of women; but even in times of peace there were places where they were the chief citizens. At Froissy, in the department of the Oise, most of the public appointments are held by women, and will be until the present holders die.

There is a postmistress instead of a postmaster; the telegraph department is run by a woman, a station mistress directs the porters at the local station; a lady barber cut the hair of the community; and the town crier also takes "mess" on to the name of her calling.

DUSKY SOLDIER SMOKERS.

Like most soldiers the native troops of India who are fighting with the Allied forces in France, are inveterate smokers. They do not, however, share Tommy's love of pipe or cigarette, for they have a peculiar means of their own of enjoying tobacco. One of their methods is to twist an oak leaf into a conical shape, fill it with tobacco, and draw the smoke through their clasped hands. Another trick is to bore a horizontal hole under the surface of a bank, place the tobacco at one extremity and with their hands clasped over the other inhale the smoke between their thumbs. This is probably the most primitive way of smoking known.

The Gardwals have very simple habits. They have practically no fear of wild beasts, and in their native country they hunt the tiger, leopard and bear, armed only with sticks and knives. The home of the Gardwals is in the Himalayan district, which is famous for its beautiful scenery and the excellent hunting to be obtained on its mountain sides.
