LIGHTING MONTREAL.

Montreal Herald, which has taken a praiseworthy interest in civic reform in that city, and is the earnest advocate of accepting the lowest tender for lighting its streets, now finds it probable that the lowest tender may be accepted. The tenders have been referred back to the full Council by the Light and Fire Committee. The full Council has 34 members and of these 16 have already declared themselves in favor of the lowest tender, and several more are confidently expected to vote the same way.

The various companies competing for the contracts have each a capital of from two to three and a half millions of dollars. In each case with one exception they utilize waterpower to develop the electric current at considerable distances from the city. The power house of the Royal is at Chambly, 18 miles from the city. This company now has the contract for lighting Montreal. Other companies that have tendered have water powers located respectively at 6, 22, and 81 miles from the city. The Imperial Company, which has also tendered, generates its current by steam power. The St. Lawrence Power Company, the lowest tenderer at \$54.75 per lamp, derives its power 22 miles up-river above the city.

During the discussion of the tenders for lighting Montreal it has been contended on behalf of the Royal that \$95 per lamp is a fair price for the work. This is the rate at which this company has tendered both in Montreal and Charlottetown. The St. Lawrence Power Company has tendered to do the same work for \$54.75 per lamp, or \$40.25 less than the Royal. This has raised some discussion as to whether the work can be done for the lower amount named. There are other cities, however that enjoy nearly as low and in some cases even lower rates. For instance the following are the rates in the cities named below:

Detroit, \$63.45; Terre Haute, \$38.95; Youngstown, Ohio, \$64; Erie, Pa., \$61.80; Davenport, Iowa, \$59; South Norwalk, Conn., \$53.56; Batavia, N. Y., \$52.75; Muncie, Ind., \$52.62; Chillicothe, Ohio, \$66; Madison, Wis. \$59; Auburn, Me., \$50; Fairbault, Minn., \$51; Spokane Falls, \$48, and others.

The Ontario Telephone Company has offered to supply up-to-date phones for Toronto at \$24 for houses and \$36 for offices, which is a reduction on the Bell Company's rates

The following is the full text of a passage in the address recently delivered by President Schurman at Cornell, and referred to in our despatches of a few days ago:

"Apart from the domain of politics and invention, America has not produced a single man or woman whose name will shine in the intellectual firmament with LaFolce, Shakespeare, Copernicus, Newton, LaFolce, Goethe, and Darwin. I know we are a youthful nation. I know the law of development is first the natural and then the spiritual; and our chief business has been to clear the continent and make it habitable.
