KILLS PAIN

TEUTONS REACH TOWN 47 MILES FROM BUCHAREST

LONDON, Nov. 28.—Mackensen and Falkenhayn have joined forces in Roumania, and the former has reached Alexandria, 47 miles south-east of Bucharest, in continuation of his advances across the Danube at Zimnita. A crossing of the river was also effected by Mackensen's forces at Iltz, near the mouth of the Alt River. The Roumanian line on the Alt River is holding firmly, despite a violent bombardment. A reassuring message from Petrograd stated that the Roumanians had been able to extricate themselves from the nut-cracker like movement of the Teutons in Western Wallachia and it is probable they have effected a wedge between Orsova and Craiova. The Roumanians admit fighting fourteen miles south of Alexandria, but say the enemy advances has been arrested. Their line, which is holding back the enemy, stretches across Wallachia to the south of Slatina, 45 miles from the Danube. All positions are being maintained in the north where, however, there has not been very much fighting. The enemy was repelled in the Oltuz Valley and at Dragonaleve.

The Germans state they are progressing along the Lower Danube, that Falkenhayn has joined forces with Mackensen and that a Mackensen army has reached the butelir's Alexander, advancing south down the Alt River, and captured the towns of Ramnitsu and Valcea. The Bulgarians assert they have occupied some islands in the Danube, one being near the mouth of the Alt. Fog and rain has slowed up operations in Macedonia, but the Serbs repelled a heavy Bulgarian counter-attack at Granišho and the Italians are making progress towards the Monastir, Presha Lake road.

BULGARIANS CROSS THE DANUBE RIVER.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
SOFIA, Nov. 27.—Via London, Nov. 28.—Bulgarian troops have effected three more crossings of the Danube all of them behind the Austro-German front in western Roumania. The crossings were made from the Bulgarian fortifications of Rahovo, Lom-Palanka and Vidin. This announcement was made by the War Office, which also reports the repulse of Russo-Roumanian attacks in Debruda.

FREE LUNCH WITH SERMON.

CHICAGO, Nov. 27.—Saloon-went on in Waukegan, Ill., last night and with them perished the free lunch. Then, along came Rev. W. E. Collins, a University of Chicago student, who said he would put in their stead something of a constructive nature. So he planned a free lunch service with his sermons.

It will be served for the first time on Sunday night, when, after the service, the entire congregation will spend an hour sipping coffee and nibbling sandwiches.

Patriotic Meetings Arranged

HARRIMAN \$40,000 RUBY SOLD FOR \$650.

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—Behind the \$60,000 Harriman jewel robbery, brought to solution today by police investigators, lies the story of a mid-aged and trusted employee who succumbed to temptation, according to his confession, while struggling to meet the cost of living in a fashionable suburb too expensive for his means. As a result he is under arrest charged with grand larceny, together with his brother, who is held on a similar charge, accused of having disposed of part of the proceeds of the robbery.

Arthur P. Duggan, 42, and married, who was guardian of the trust company vault where Mrs. E. H. Harriman, widow of the railroad capitalist, kept her jewelry, found them one day on the floor of the safe deposit, he told the Police Inspector Faurot today.

"The opportunity presented itself, as I was in debt to the extent of \$700," the inspector quoted Duggan as saying. "My salary was not a large one. I was getting over \$1,700 a year, and I found it hard to live on that amount to keep up with the living at Larchmont. I was tempted many times to some time, waiting to see who owned it, and when no one put in a claim that it was lost I decided to get a loan on some of it."

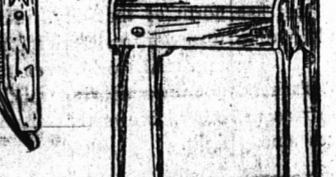
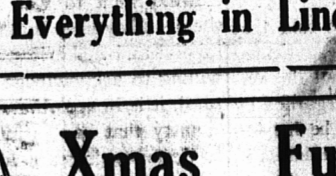
