THE STATION SITE.

If there was any doubt in the minds of the railway authorities as to the site on which the people of Charlottetown desire the new railway station to be built it will be removed by a perusal of the addresses made and the resolution adopted at the Board of Trade meeting on Thursday evening. At that meeting, large and representative as it was, every shade of public opinion was brought to the front. The subject was pretty thoroughly threshed out and the resolution adopted with so much unanimity must be taken as expressing the consensus of public opinion here.

A new railway station is an imperative need, long felt by our people and now recognised by the Government. All the great railway companies recognise the value and importance of having their city stations placed so as to be readily and conveniently accessible to the people whom they serve and to whom they look for revenue. In Montreal the Canadian Pacific and Grand Trunk have acquired their present convenient stations at a cost of many hundreds of thousands of dollars. In Ottawa, in like manner the railway stations have been brought at great cost within a stone's throw of the great public buildings. In Charlottetown the business centers at our public square, where the Legislative Buildings, the Court House, Post Office, Market, the banks and principal stores are located. Between this centre and the harbor front, where the steamboat wharves are, Great George Street and Queen Street are the principal thoroughfares, Great George being central for the entire city. Everything in reason indicates the junction of one or the other of these streets, with Water Street as the ideal site for the new station.

It does not appear that this location need be a very costly one, or one dollar more so than the site of the present Round House, (which has been favored by some) when the cost of removal and rebuilding that structure is taken into account. Be that as it may the Dominion is not too poor to do for Charlottetown what the people desire, when it can be done at a cost of a sum much less than has been expended in cities of smaller size or a like purpose. Economy is very well, if it were practiced equally all over the Dominion, but we object altogether to the notion that our new railway station

shall be located in one corner of the city and our citizens and the travelling public compelled to tramp or drive over a long distance for all time, simply to gratify a cheese paragon that is not applied in other parts of the Dominion.

It will pay the Railway Department and the Dominion Government to give the people their way in this matter. Located between Prince and George Street the new station will be an ornament to the City, a perpetual convenience to all who travel and a source of general satisfaction all round. It is also worth something to secure a firm and a healthful site. We confidently hope and trust that in a matter of so much importance for the present and future the almost unanimous wish of our citizens and the patrons of the railway will be cheerfully complied with. There being no engineering difficulties in the way, this is a matter in which it seems the plain duty of those in authority to comply with the publicly expressed wishes of the people of Charlottetown.

THE PATRIOT AND THE STATION.

The esteemed Patriot on October 30, referring to Manager Pottinger's visit in connection with locating the new railway station said:

The different places suggested were all examined, and at the consensus of opinion seemed to be in favor of the site at the foot of Prince Street alongside the ferry wharf, where the roundhouse now stands. . . . The opinion appears to be general among the citizens that the site indicated is by far the most preferable, and with respect to public convenience could not be equalled. It is much closer to the city proper than the present station, convenient to hotel, wharves and steamers and the general situation is such as to give the station a prominent place on the water front.

On the following day, October 31, The Patriot returned to the subject and said:

In regard to the site opposite the hotel Davies, on Water between Great George and Prince streets, it is evident to all that if this were selected the foot of Prince street would have to be closed by gates, when trains were leaving or arriving; because they would in many instances stretch across the street "previous" to starting and after arrival. This would never do! Again, the cost of the land alone, not counting the buildings thereon would be in the vicinity of fifty thousand dollars, and perhaps more. As a rule the Examiner differs with the Patriot and the Guardian does general objecting on its own account. Surely there ought to be one matter in which these three could agree, and that might be a site for a new station.

Yesterday The Patriot returned to the subject in the following terms:

The block opposite the Hotel Davies is the place where the Charlottetown Board of Trade has decided is the proper and best site for the proposed new railway station in this city. And this decision is eminently right. It will meet with the hearty approval of all citizens.

Thus in one short week the site which The Patriot declared "would never do," became "eminently right" in its estimation. And The Patriot had to come round to the Guardian's view of the case in order to become "right" itself.

A bill has been introduced in the House of Representatives at Washington providing that cloths and textiles shall be labeled to show the materials of which they are made. This measure is the result of the numerous and continued frauds practised upon unskilled purchasers by the sale of shoddy and mixed fabrics for woollen goods. The buying public need this protection. Shoddy is cloth made of old woollen fabrics torn into shreds and again spun and woven. For unes have been made in selling such cloth, or a mixture of shoddy and newes all wool. The bill is intended to give purchasers a true idea of what they are paying for. The Ottawa Department of Agriculture has recently circulated considerable literature on the subject in-

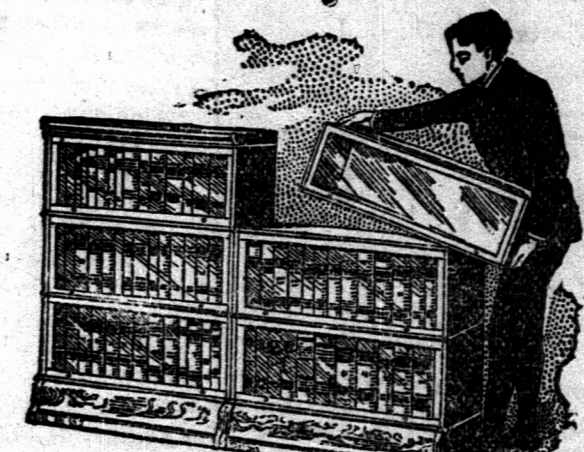
