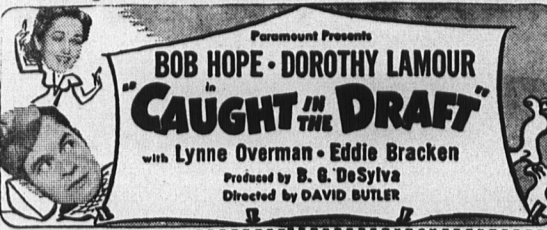

Monsignor Hughes Honored at Banquet

(Winnipeg Northwest Review) REGINA.—Rev. Peter F. Hughes D.D., rector at Holy Rosary cathedral since 1931, has been appointed pastor of St. John the Baptist parish, Estevan, according to announcement made by His Grace Archbishop P. J. Monaghan, D. D. Monsignor Hughes will take over his new duties on August 31. He will be succeeded by Rev. Fr. Andrew J. Phelan, professor at Regina Cleric seminary since the fall of 1932. In his ten years at Holy Rosary Monsignor Hughes has won a large number of friends among Catholics and non-Catholics alike, and he was one of the hardest working priests ever to be stationed in Regina. No task was too great for him to undertake, regardless of whether it was of a spiritual or temporal nature. He was interested at all times in the welfare of his parishioners. Monsignor Hughes was born at Emerald, Prince Edward Island. He was educated at the Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, and graduated from there with a B. A. degree in 1909, and afterward he studied philosophy and theology at the Grand Seminary, Quebec. That he was a brilliant student was evidenced by the conferring on him of the degree of Doctor of Divinity.

Ordained June 15, 1918

He was ordained on June 15, 1918, by Rt. Rev. Henry J. O'Leary, D. D., of Charlottetown, at Kinokora, P. E. I. His first appointment was to the teaching staff of St. Dunstan's University, P. E. I., where he remained one year from 1914-15. He studied at the Catholic University of Washington, and from 1915-1922, he was professor at St. Dunstan's. For four years, 1915-1919, he was also secretary to Bishop O'Leary. In 1922, Father Hughes went to Edmonton. When Rev. Fr. James C. McGuigan was made Archbishop of Regina, he insisted that Fr. Hughes accompany him to his see and in 1931 Fr. Hughes was appointed rector of Holy Rosary. The title Monsignor was conferred on him in 1935.

Honored at Banquet

REGINA.—Rt. Rev. P. F. Hughes, D.D., rector at Holy Rosary cathedral since 1931, was honored Sunday evening at a farewell gathering of more than 600 parishioners and friends in the cathedral auditorium. Monsignor Hughes will leave Regina late next week, having been appointed pastor of St. John the Baptist parish, Estevan. In appreciation of the many services he has performed for the welfare of Holy Rosary cathedral, parishioners presented him with a purse of money, while numerous spiritual bouquets were given to him by the various organizations in the parish. On the platform, in addition to Msgr. Hughes, were Rt. Rev. A. J. Janssen, V. G., representing His Grace Archbishop P. J. Monaghan, D. D., who at present is away on his summer itinerary of the diocese; Rev. Father E. J. MacGilvray, S. J., rector of Campion college, Rev. Father C. S. Godin, curate at Holy Rosary, Mrs. H. Acaster and Mrs. T. Guilfoyle, of the League of the Sacred Heart, Miss Genevieve Curdin, Legion of Mary, Miss Agnes Inglis, Jr., C. W. L., M. J. Reilly, Catholic Lay Retreat Association, Frank Malone, representing the Catholic men in the parish, Hub Bishop, Knights of Columbus, J. Stanley Byrnes, of the Cathedral Young People's Club and Frank Smith, chairman of the program.

It is with feeling of sadness and regret that we have come here to bid our beloved Monsignor farewell," Mr. Smith said. "During the time he has been with us, he has with the greatest humility faithfully served the people of this parish. No sacrifice has been too great for him to make and never once has he been heard to complain. As God's anointed, he has had but one thought—the salvation of the souls under his charge."

Msgr. Janssen Speaks

Msgr. Janssen referred to Msgr. Hughes as the ideal parish priest. "He has done marvellous work in the parish since coming to it 10 years ago," Msgr. Janssen said. "No one will deny that. When Msgr. Hughes took charge, the parish was burdened with debt, the finances were bad, and things were not just running as well as they should have been. Since his first day, he hasn't spared time or work to ease the burden on the people. And what's more, he has done all the worrying himself these past 10 years." The Vicar-General said that Msgr. Hughes not only was successful from the financial standpoint of the parish, but he did not forget the spiritual side. "The parish is very devout," he remarked. "You all know that. Msgr. Hughes knew everyone of his parishioners personally. Their welfare was his welfare. Rich or poor, they were all a part of his flock."

Catholics from all over Regina and district will miss him. Msgr. Janssen continued, but it is the poor people who will miss him the most. They knew him for his great spirit of charity, and for his great quality of "Love Thy Neighbor." Msgr. Hughes would never fall them in their hour of need. Msgr. Janssen concluded by saying that all the priests and Catholics saw in Msgr. Hughes a

great idol of the true Christian life.

Helped Build New Churches

Father Codin spoke briefly to show that Msgr. Hughes did not confine his work to Holy Rosary parish alone while in Regina. "He has been largely instrumental in erecting churches at Pense, Lumsden, Craven, Pilot Butte, Rowatt," he said, "and helped to finance the renovating of the Church at Regina Beach."

Other speakers were Rev. Father MacGilvray, S. J., Mrs. H. Acaster, Miss Curdin, Hug Bishop and Mr. J. Reilly, who presented to Msgr. Hughes the purse and a farewell scroll, containing the names of the parishioners. Msgr. Hughes thanked the parishioners for their kind thoughts, and the committee who was responsible for arranging the program. Artists who rendered numbers were Miss Mary Moynihan, accompanied by Miss Kay Rooney, Miss Erica Zentner, accompanied by Miss Cunningham, and Mr. John Bearegard. —P.W.D.
