TWO CHILDREN WHO OWN MILLIONAIRE FORTUNES

Senator Clark's Grandson Born to a Vast Fortune—Little Margaret Carnegie to Be Presented With a \$2,500,000 Palace as a Christmas Gift by Her Father.

BUTTE, MONT., Dec. 13.—No babe was ever born with more brilliant money prospects before it as the little stranger who came to the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Clark, Jr., last week.
The only grandson of W. A. Clark, the man who debarred the whole State of Montana in order to become United States senator, this baby is prospectively the heir to the greater portion of his enormous wealth.
This Butte baby, born in the cold and the smelter smoke of Butte, if events take their natural course, will direct a tremendous power.
If the Clark fortune multiplies at the same rate as the other great fortunes of the present generation have grown, the one which will descend to the Clark grandson will be perhaps the greatest in the world.
No man knows the exact wealth of Senator Clark. It is doubtful if he knows himself. Various estimates place it anywhere from \$70,000,000 to \$180,000,000. Most of it is in property which is increasing in value by leaps and bounds.
There is no other private fortune in the world, present or prospective, of the size of the Clark fortune to-day, or as it will be 25 years hence, that is to be divided among so few heirs of the blood.
Only six descendants of Senator Clark are alive to-day. It is natural to suppose that the grandson will secure the bulk of the fortune, especially if the child's father names him W. A. Clark III.
NEW YORK, Dec. 13.—Little Margaret

Carnegie's Christmas gift will be the most extraordinary ever given a child. It is a magnificent house towering above the other splendid homes at Ninety-first Street, and surrounded by a park spacious enough to accommodate two other mansions.
The great iron and steel master is coming home from his Scotch castle for the express purpose of turning over to his daughter the \$2,500,000 palace which he began to build four years ago.
Little Margaret will be made the absolute mistress of the house and all it contains. The deeds will be made out in her name, with her famous father as trustee. Her father and her mother will in a measure be her tenants. She will be recognized head of the house, which has been constructed with especial reference to her future needs.
Mr. Carnegie, who arrived Wednesday, insisted on returning to America against the advice of his physicians, as he wanted to personally present his magnificent gift to his daughter and heir of all his millions.
The gorgeous main entrance to the palace on Ninety-first Street has never been opened. The key to it will be handed to Margaret, and she will be the first to open the house—her house.
The formal presentation of the house by Mr. Carnegie to his daughter will take place on Christmas Day. Margaret will give a party to some of her child friends on that day. She will have a Christmas tree freighted with gifts for her guests.

J. PIERPONT MORGAN'S SECOND MAMMOTH TRUST

All the Great Coal Mines and Coal Railroads—Capital \$400,000,000—Wants President Baer to Take Charge—What the Collieries Are Worth. Their Present Output Yearly.

NEW YORK Dec. 13.—J. Pierpont Morgan's new coal trust will rival the Northern Securities Company.
The capital will be \$400,000,000, and all the working will be on a mammoth scale. Mr. Morgan has already chosen his lieutenants, and is ready to pay down \$145,000,000 for the mines of the independent operators. He will control the huge "combine" as absolutely as other projects he handles, and will be the real coal king of the United States.
President George F. Baer, of the Reading Railroad, also head of the New Jersey Central, who refused to accept the presidency of the Lehigh Valley, has promised J. P. Morgan to become head of the holding company of the trust. This statement was made positively to-day by competent authority. Mr. Morgan wanted Mr. Baer to assume the presidency of the Lehigh Valley. There were two things in the way; first, Mr. Baer's refusal to take on any greater burden, and the lesser problem of a law which stood in the way Mr. Baer said to Mr. Morgan:
"I cannot accept the presidency of the Lehigh Valley because I now carry as great a burden as president of

two operating roads as I can stand. When you want me to become president of a general corporation to control all the anthracite roads I shall be glad to accept, but I do not care to direct the individual operations of any roads other than those I now have in charge."
It is on the distinct understanding that Mr. Baer shall become the head that the new "combine" of coal roads is being organized. The independent collieries will cost between \$40,000,000 and \$150,000,000.
The division by districts, the railroads which share in the distribution, the independent output, and valuation are as follows:—
Scranton—Output, 3,861,372 tons; value \$25,000,000. Pittston—Output, 2,670,890 tons; value \$18,000,000; Erie, Delaware & Hudson and Central Railroad of New Jersey and L. & W. Hazleton—Output, 5,354,574 tons; value, \$38,000,000; Lehigh Valley and Pennsylvania. Schuylkill—Output, 6,152,890 tons; value, \$50,000,000; Philadelphia & Reading, Lehigh Valley, and Pennsylvania.
Total output this year, 18,361,708 tons; value, \$145,000,000.
Total output for 1901, 59,905,951 tons.
