New Dominion Loan Issued Today

(Special to The Guardian)

TORONTO, Sept. 9.—Announcement has just been made by Hon. J. A. Robb, Minister of Finance, that the Dominion Government has concluded its financial plans for the year by disposing of a new issue of \$750,000 floating year interest bonds through a strong Canadian syndicate consisting of Dominion Securities Corporation Limited, Wood Gundy and Company, A. E. Ames and Company, Limited, and National City Company, Limited, the Bank of Montreal, the Royal Bank of Canada, and the Canadian Bank of Commerce. The bonds are being offered today to the public through practically every bond dealer and stock broker in Canada, as well as through chartered banks, in order to range the long term financing in Canada rather than in another market. The Government has followed the policy that has been almost rigidly adhered to during the last several years. The Victory Loans of 1917, 1918 and 1919 were sold in the London market, and the refunding loans of 1923 and 1924 were offered in the same manner. Short term financing such as one year note issues have been placed in United States where the demand for such short term bonds is so strong that such borrowing is cheap. These short term notes, however, are of interest only to the large financial institutions and others who definitely require the return of their money within a very short period. It is understood that the proceeds of the new issue will be used for refunding purposes, including the redemption of \$42,000,000 of tax free bonds which will fall due on December 1st next. In this matter also, the strict policy of retiring tax-free bonds by the usual tax-free issue is being followed. It is believed that the new issue should prove exceedingly attractive to Canadian investors. The maturity is fifteen years, in other words these bonds run for the same number of years as did the 1934 maturity bonds when issued in 1918 and which have become so popular among investors of all classes. The new bonds are being offered at 97.85 and interest at which the interest return is over 4.35 per cent.

Because of the success of the 1923 and 1924 refunding loans it is believed in financial circles that the present issue will be quickly snapped up. Investors who were fortunate enough to have purchased the 1923 issue of refunding loan bonds, have had the satisfaction of watching their bonds rise in value by more than four points while those who purchased last year have also witnessed a substantial improvement upon their price paid. It is a fact that at Dominion of Canada issues floated since the War are now selling at a substantial premium over their original issue price. In considering the new loan another point upon which comment has been made is that new offerings of a highest grade of bonds have been scarce during the last few weeks and from all indications the volume of new bond issues will be unusually light during the remainder of the year. No more Dominion Government financing is expected amongst of the provinces and large municipalities have already completed their requirements. Dealers prominently associated with the issue are urging clients to enter application as quickly as possible. Similarly to last year order will be accepted by any bond dealer, stock exchange broker, or any branch of any chartered banks.
