"Vic Langille was one of the greatest guys I ever knew. He was smart not only when he was in the ring but also when he was out of it.

"I know Vic back in his barefoot days, and have known him through the years. He was always a fighter, but never a bully; always ready to stand up for what he thought was right, no matter if it friend or foe.

"It is easy enough for a fellow to be a fighter when he is sitting on top of the world, and Vic was in his prime; but when suddenly things turn in the opposite direction and everyone is taking a sock at you, it takes plenty of courage to stick up your dukes and counter the blows directed from many different angles, but Vic had it in heavy loads.

"The little incidents of tough luck that came to him along the way, the shaking off with a shrug of the shoulders, the fact that he could not shake, but it took a long time for it to put him on the canvas. More than three years, and then they had to gang up on him to do it.

"Working with a local manufacturing firm three years ago, he sustained an injury. A heavy piece of structural steel hit him in the chest and punctured a lung. He gave that a good battle, but other complications set in and slowly were him down.

"Six weeks ago, before he left for Antigonish, I was in to see him. He was only a shadow of his old self. He was worn down from a sturdy lad of 173 pounds to a bare ninety. The once powerful body was gone, but the spirit was still there. He'd rip back the bed coverings. 'Look at that,' he'd say. 'That doesn't look much like the 173 pounds I carried into the ring the last time. So help me, I'm down to a frazzle (and he was) but I'm not licked yet. I'll give her a fight. I could have beaten that wallop in the chest, but these other things are getting a strange hold on me. Wouldn't be so bad if the exact trouble were known, but it isn't, so what in hell can be done about that? I take medicine, but it doesn't do any good.'

"Well, I said, trying to console him, 'You might beat it yet. You're strong her all you've got, anyway.'

Yanks Defeat Detroit For 5th Straight

NEW YORK, May 25—(AP)—A seventh-inning home run by Tony Lazzeri today provided the winning margin for the Yankees as they defeated Detroit Tigers 4-3 here for their fifth straight victory and widened their first-place margin to two full games over Philadelphia Athletics.

The game cost Detroit the services of Mickey Cochrane, catcher-manager. After his homer in the third temporarily tied the score at one-all, Cochrane came to bat again in the fifth and was struck in the right temple by a ball pitched by Irving (Bump) Hadley.

Schoolboy Rowe started his first game of the year for the third-place Tigers. He gave up 10 hits including Lazzeri's four-bagger and another by Joe Dimaggio.

Cleveland Indians nosed out the Athletics 4-2 in the first encounter of a three game series in Philadelphia.

The Indians, scoring a run in the first inning, two in the fourth and one in the ninth were never headed, but Mel Harder was relieved in the seventh after the first three men up hit safely, scoring two runs.

St. Louis Browns bunched three errors in the first inning to help Boston Red Sox win 4-2 and provide Bob (Lefty) Grove with his second triumph of the season.

The game was tied at 1-1 when the Chicagoans began their seventh inning assault on Deshong, who had held them to two hits. Before the inning was over three runners crossed the plate.

NEW YORK, May 25—Gordon (Mickey) Cochrane, Manager of Detroit Tigers in the American Baseball League, was in a "severe condition" at St. Elizabeth's Hospital tonight, suffering from a skull fracture he received when he was "beaten" by one of Bump Hadley's pitches during today's game between the Tigers and New York Yankees.

Dr. Robert E. Walsh, the Yankees' club physician, said an X-ray examination revealed a definite skull fracture on his left temple. Cochrane was resting quietly, however, at midnight ADT Dr. Walsh said, and there was little prospect of a turn for the worse tonight. His condition had remained unchanged since he was brought to the hospital late this afternoon.

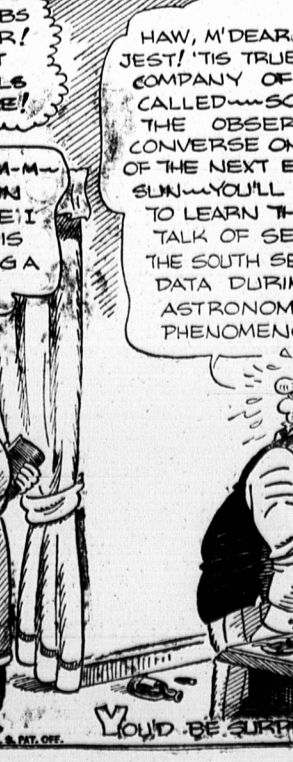

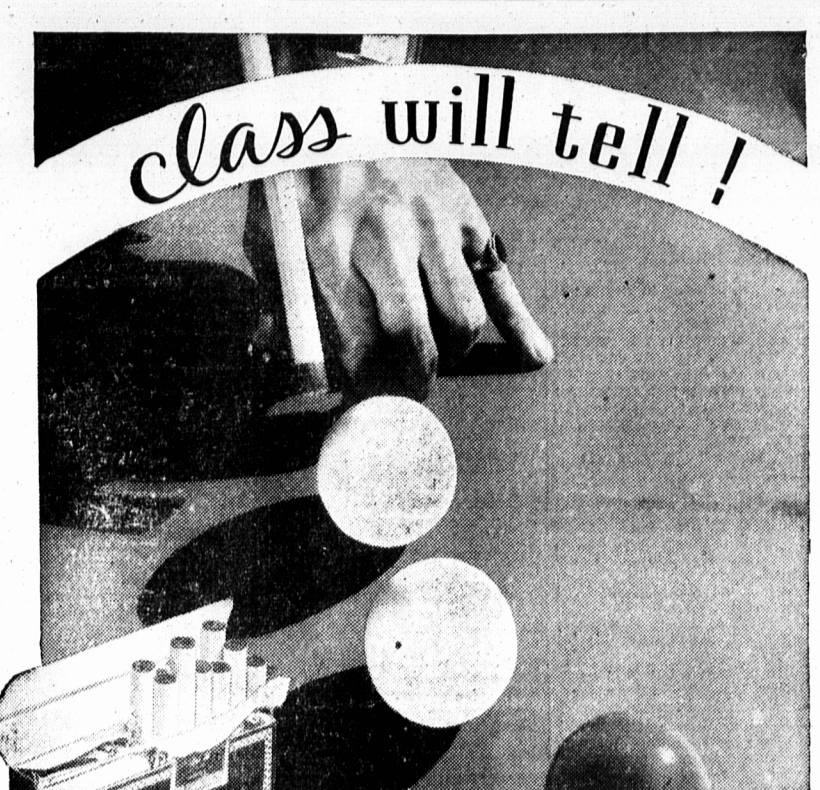
Budge unleashed the full blast of his game to crush the acrobatic Georgian, Bryan (Biby) Grant, in four swift sets. The scores were 6-3, 6-1, 6-3, 6-3, as Budge ran his team mate ragged with a brand of tennis that indicated the red-headed ace of the United States forces is right at the peak.

"Budge played the greatest game ever seen," said the chunky southerner. "His backhand was the most marvelously accurate thing I have ever been up against."

While Budge was polishing off Grant, Mako teamed with Bobby Rigg to trounce the United States doubles cabin, George Lott, and young Wayne Sabin, 6-1, 7-5, 6-1. Grant's disappointing performance against Budge did not alter the general belief that the "mighty atom" will be picked for the no. two singles berth over Frank Parker, who ranks a notch above Grant on the national list.
