Big Boxing Card Set For Friday Night

Giving the heavies a breathing spell Promoter Joe McDonald has put together a fine card for Friday night next when Bennie Binns, pride of the Island middleweights swaps punches with Joe Hartnett of Halifax, claimant for the Maritime pro title.

Hartnett, known all over Canada and the States is a game willing boxer with plenty of boxing ability and will prove a big drawing card and at the same time be one of the toughest opponents that Binns, ex-Maritime amateur titleholder has ever faced. The Halifax boy has faced some of the best in the game and always he has given his opponents and the fans alike a run for their money. He is expected to arrive in the city today where he will taper off his training.

Binns is right in the "pink" and eager for the gong. Bennie knows full well that he is tackling a tough foe but he has no qualms about it at all. Hartnett may be a better boxer but the local boy's terrific hitting ability should stand him in good stead.

Then there is the semi-final bringing together Harry Burns of Amherst former featherweight champ of the Maritimes and Jimmy McInnis of Charlottetown finalist in the recent Olympic Trials. This bout is bound to be a sweet boxing match. Burns, clever as they come will face a boy who probably is the smartest boxer on the Island today. But don't think it will be any "pink tea" affair. Both these boys can hit and hit hard and a knockout would not surprise in the least.

Three other bouts wind up the card with one of the prelims being a lightweight fight. Adolph Kelly of Bear River who it will be remembered gave Johnstone of Cardigan quite a scrap in the heavy tournament meets Harold Pymter a 175 pound boy from Kensington.

NEW YORK, Sept. 15—Although there are still nearly two weeks to go in this dizzy National League race, from the looks of today's standings and the remainder of the schedule, the task of catching the Giants seems almost an impossibility.

Of course, anything can happen—as it has been happening since mid-season—but the Giants, with a 41-2 game lead over the second Place Cardinals and with 13 games to play to the Gas House Gang's 12, appear safe.

As things stand now—with the entire National League program rained out today—if the Giants play only a shade over 500 ball, winning seven and losing six, the Cardinals would have to take 11 of their 12 starts.

But, since six of those 12 remaining games for St. Louis are with the always dangerous Chicago Cubs, and inasmuch as the Cards' pitching is riddled, except for Dizzy Dean, the task appears far too great even for as tough an outfit as the Cardinals.

AMERICAN LEAGUE

NEW YORK, Sept. 15—(A.P.)—New York Yankees, seeking to create an all-time American League record for a pennant winner's lead over the rest of the pack, shot 18 1-2 games in front again today by clubbing White Sox 7-1 at Chicago.

Monte Pearson chalked up his 19th victory of the year against six defeats, but he was not around when the game ended. Centre fielder Larry Rosenthal of the Sox, beating out a hit in the eighth inning, with Pearson covering first, stepped on Pearson's ankle while crossing the bag and injured him seriously enough to require his leaving the game.

Schoolboy Rowe chalked up his 18th pitching victory today as the Tigers came from behind with a six-run spurge in the fourth inning to clinch an 8-5 decision over Philadelphia Athletics at Detroit.

Although touched for 11 hits, the same number his Detroit mates collected, Rowe was only in danger in the first, when Bob Johnson's 23rd homer featured a two-run attack.

With the aid of homers number 39 and 40 by Hal Trosky, and an assortment of 13 other base hits by the rest of his mates, Johnny Allen chalked up his 20th pitching victory of the year at Cleveland, hurling the Indians to a 13-2 win over Boston Red Sox.

Trosky drove in seven runs and got four hits in four official times at bat.

With the ability they've shown all season to beat the Browns easily—Wash. Senators pounded out a double victory at St. Louis.

The Senators took the opener 13-7 and were on the long end of a 6-1 score when the nightcap ended in the St. Louis half of the seventh inning because of darkness. The Browns have won only three of their 22 games against Washington this year.

Braddock's Hand Said Improving

NEW YORK, Sept. 15—The New York State Athletic Commission heard second-hand today that Jimmy Braddock's injured hand was showing satisfactory improvement.

Braddock was to have reported to the Commission to tell about the injury which led to postponement of his heavyweight title match with Max Schmeling. Instead the Commission received a letter from Dr. Fred Albee of Venice, Fla. Dr. Albee reported Braddock improving but said it would be inadvisable for him to resume training for at least two months.

The Commission then set Nov. 15 as the date for the next report on Braddock's condition.

Tommy Raymond, driving for the first time in three years and reining the fast moving Saint John gelding for the first time in a race brought him in third in the first heat, won the second in a tight finish with High Toby and came up beautifully to barely nose out the Upper Stewacke gelding in the final.

Bobel Wyn, Machias owned gelding, could do no better than a second place in the first heat. High Toby won second money, winning the first heat in 2.10 1-4 and placing second in the other two.

Coming within one-quarter second of equalling the record on the fastest half mile track in Canada Mildred May driven by Joney Clukey won the first heat in the Junior Free-For-All in 2.05, but could only garner second money to Bud Wenger, driven by Avery, who placed third in the first heat and took the next two. 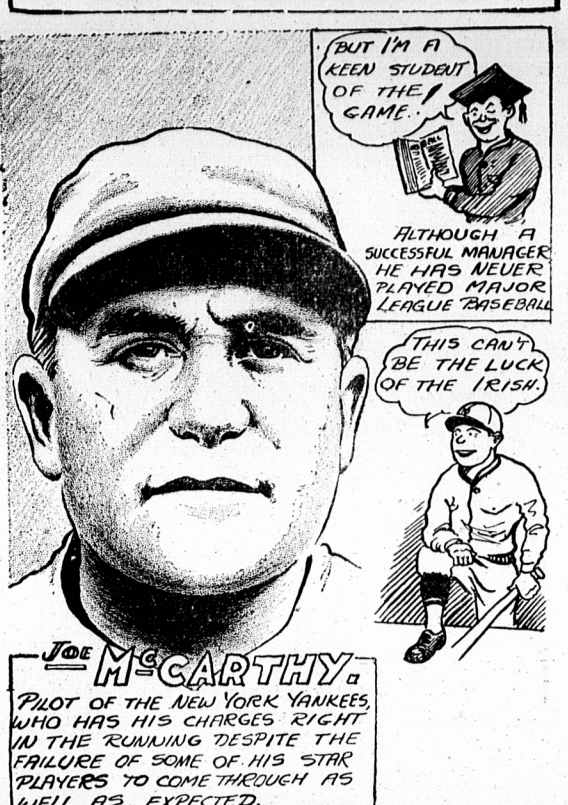
Junior Series Deadlocked

Somerville Eliminated As Upsets Feature Tourney

GARDEN CITY, N. Y., Sept. 15—A tidal wave of upsets, brought on by dripping skies and the natural hazards of this ancient golfing ground, swept over the United States amateur championship today and left in its wake the wreckage of a flock of title hopes. Ross "Sandy" Somerville among them.

While four Sandy's mates in the compact Canadian contingent, Joe Thompson, Jack Cameron and Gordon Taylor Jr.—were swinging triumphantly into the third round, the London, Ont., veteran lost his usual accuracy and his change for the crown.

David L. Davis, bespectacled collegian of Austin, Texas, caught the great Canadian when none of his shots was under control and Somerville was whipped 3 and 2. Sandy's outgoing 44 was seven big strokes over par.

Thompson, swarthy mite from Hamilton, was swinging sweetly as he ousted Harold Leblond, Madeira, Ohio, by 4 and 3. Joe matched par 37 going out to take a three hole lead.

Cameron, Ottawa-born referee in the National Hockey League, also had his shots on line as he dropped O'Hara Watts of Dallas, but the Canadian veteran was forced to show steel-nerves before winning one up on the 19th hole.

Taylor, long a topflight figure in Toronto, was off, his game but luckily his opponent, Walter Emery of Oklahoma City, was even worse. The American had a medal of 84. Taylor's approximate 81 gave him a two up win.

In the drizzling rain that dampened the process of reducing the field of 64 contestants, a bevy of favorites were washed out of the picture.

SPRINGHILL, N. S., Sept. 15—(C.P.)—Yarmouth Gateways, Maritime baseball champions of 1935 trashed Springhill Fencebusters 10-1 here today to take a lead of two games to one in a three-off-five series for the Nova Scotia championship.

Thomas Albert Linkletter, Springhill's big man from the mountains, was exploded from his mound in the middle of the sixth inning after Gateways' big artillery had scored six runs in a two-inning rally.

Southpaw Cople LeBlanc threw them like lightning for Yarmouth today and he was so effective only three miners reached third base and nine batters went down swinging. His fast curves were hit but five times.

Yarmouth's overpowering victory was a stunning blow to Springhill hopes and a surprise to the dopesters who had expected the Busters to win on their own field after the 13-7 trimming they gave Gateways in the second game at Yarmouth last week.

Maritime Lady Golfers Ousted In Canadian Open

MONTREAL, Sept. 15—(C.P.)—The Maritime challenge for Canada's feminine golfing classic—the open—vanished today as Maude Howard of Halifax and Audrey McLeod of Saint John met elimination in the first round of match play.

Just 28 years ago another golfer from Saint John, Mary Thompson, captured this prized title and Miss McLeod, as game a shotmaker as they come, only admitted defeat today on the 19th hole against Audrey MacIntosh of Montreal. It was the only extra hole match of the day.

Miss Howard gave as stubborn an exhibition against Mrs. A. J. D. Wright of Montreal and for a good part of the match appeared headed for a win. She twice held a two-hole advantage over the Montrealer. Prosperity, however, seemed to disagree with her and two up at the end of the 12th, Miss Howard saw her lead dwindle to all even at the 15th.

A long driver, the Montreal matron found the lengthy 16th and 17th holes to her liking and fired winning golf to pull out a 2 and 1 victory.

Mrs. Leo Doan, resident now of Ottawa but once of Saint John, also was shoved to the sidelines by the brilliant golf of Marian McDougall, United States threat from Portland, Ore. Mrs. Doan, recently crowned Quebec Provincial Champion was ousted by a 6 and 5 count.

Pre-tournament favorites, Margery Kirkham of Montreal and Marion Miley of Lexington, Ky. found the going smooth. Both had 5 and 4 victories the Montrealer taking the measure of Dorothy Stanforth of Lucerne, Que., and the southerner defeating Mrs. C. R. Harbaugh of Wilmoughby, O.

The defending champion, Toronto's Ada MacKenzie, showed a burst of her old-time form in eliminating Margaret Symington of Montreal 5 and 4. The experts were unwilling to concede the Ontario woman an edge over Miss Kirkham and Miss Miley, however, due to her poor showing in the medal round.
