PRUNING TOMATO VINES.

It rarely ever is necessary to trellis tomato vines that have been kept carefully trimmed back, as they stand up straight, having no heavy tops to lop over. Then, where tomato vines are kept well-trimmed, the sustenance which usually goes to the development of the long branches is utilized in developing and ripening the fruit. This not only produces an early and heavy crop, but fruit of extra size, fine color and superior quality.

Tomato vines should be kept well trimmed back till there is little or no droop to the branches, so the fruit will not be far enough away from the trunk of the vines to bend them downward toward the ground, thus preventing the fruit from becoming in contact with the damp earth, causing rot; and also holding the fruit in the correct position to reach and handle, while the full benefit of the sun will be received to promote growth and development.

There is hardly any set rule for pruning tomato vines, as it must be done according to size, age and thriftiness of the plants. They should be trimmed in such manner that there will not be an excess of foliage—done late in the evening, so that the soothing, cooling effect of night may act on the wounded branches before the heat of the sun strikes them. Cuts should be smooth, and care should be taken that the vines are not strained nor damaged in any way while the pruning is in progress. Trimming should be begun shortly after the main tree is formed, none of the trunk or main branches should be entirely removed; the small branches and the extreme ends of the larger ones being the ones to clip back regularly.—M. C.

CLOSING STOCK LETTER.

New York, July 14. The stock market has been quite weak for the past few days, following the liquidation in Missouri Pacific and the selling from abroad, which, though applying to the Canadian Pacific, especially affected Canadian Pacific. Such transactions have induced considerable short selling by floor traders, directed first against one stock and then another where the outlook for the property was uncertain and the stock seemed vulnerable. All of this naturally produced some general liquidation. Today, however, the market has acted better and the selling has been less aggressive, while any attempt to cover has not found a very plentiful supply. As a result, prices at the close are better. News from Mexico indicates that the end of the Huerta regime is close at hand. After the long wait, it would be indeed a relief to have matters down there take more settled form. The most that can be said of the market in general is that it acts superiorly well under the adverse conditions with which it has to contend. Total sales stocks 259,320.—Post and Flag.

FOXES - 1914 VS. 1913 advertisement: '(Continued from page two) without comment and that is the confidence of the older ranchmen, (in-fact) by financial conditions in the business which places them in a position best expressed by one well known fox man "I won't starve if I don't sell a fox. If they want my foxes they'll have to pay me my price." As numbers of the older men are beginning to take this independent stand it argues well for the holding of the present or higher prices, and these men should be known and given due credit for their independence. This article while dealing with "Class A" foxes, nevertheless reflects the condition of the whole fox industry. Island ranches for acclimated foxes and all Island raised foxes have advanced in price within a month and before October will undoubtedly bring very much higher prices than the present market. On the contrary imported foxes, with one exception, are much lower in price than last year, a condition due to several causes. To sum up: CONDITIONS JULY 10TH, 1913. 1st.—Uncertainty and doubt. Practically a total cessation of fox business. 2nd.—Over 150 options offered mostly by speculators who were ready to sell at any price at the first sign of weakness in the market. 3rd.—Prices ranging from \$9000 to \$10,000, and very few sales going through. 4th.—Island money practically used up and no amount of foreign capital in sight. CONDITIONS JULY 10TH, 1914. 1st.—Confidence, great activity. Ranches building all over the Island and on the Mainland. 2nd.—Less than fifty options offered, held in most part by ranchmen who are independent enough to carry the foxes over another year or get their prices. 3rd.—Prices ranging from \$12,000 to \$13,500 or an increase of 25 per cent over last year and a number of buyers yet to be heard from. 4th.—Outside capital from three great centres, London, New York and Montreal becoming heavily interested. The fox industry has come to stay and the price of first class breeders whether "Class A" or otherwise will continue high for years to come.
