LONDON, May 27.—Bolshevik forces continue to pour into Persia. They have occupied Rasht from which British troops retired toward Teheran says Daily Sketch which disputes accuracy of information received here yesterday regarding situation in the middle East.

Moncton Has \$100,000 Fire

MONCTON, May 27.—Two serious fires, which caused a combined property loss of \$100,000 or more, gave the city fire fighting apparatus seven and one half hours of almost continuous labor yesterday. First conflagration broke out in the plant of Record Foundry and Machine Company. Loss at least \$50,000 probably \$60,000. At 12 o'clock a nasty fire in Bank of Nova Scotia building, corner Main and Market Streets broke out. The blaze was located chiefly in the east and south corners of the building and roof being more than ordinarily difficult to reach. Damage to the building itself and the tenants on three floors placed at \$40,000 or \$50,000.

High Winds Do Damage in West

REGINA, May 27.—The high winds last week touched practically the whole of Province causing from "slight" to "incalculable" damage to early crops, according to a report issued by the statistics branch of the province by the Provincial Department of Agriculture. SYDNEY, May 27.—The united mine workers of Nova Scotia decided today to take immediate action in securing new wage increase, decided at recent convention at Truro. A flat increase of one dollar per day for all metal men will be asked, will also increase of 25 cents per ton for piece work.
