More Radios Sold

OTTAWA, July 11 — (CP) — Sales of radio receiving sets by Canadian producers in April increased to 47,724 units compared with 42,841 in April last year, the value at list prices increasing sharply to \$3,452,461 as against \$1,862,290, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today.

Imports during the first four months of the year amounted to 28,972 sets of all kinds valued at \$965,751, while exports in the same period were 15,631 sets at a value of \$605,249.

King's Titles To Be Unchanged On Coins

OTTAWA, July 11 — (CP) — The "Emperor of India" part of the King's titles is being deleted by Canadian statute but the "et ind imp" appearing on Canadian coins will stay there until these coins go out of circulation.

That is what Finance Minister Abbott said today when queried about what would happen to that part of the King's title appearing on the coins now that India is being given self-government.

He added, however, that new Canadian coin issues would not carry the Emperor of India title and new dies would be necessary for these.
