Privy Council Dismisses Appeal

LONDON, July 31 (CP)—Viscount Simon, one of the lords on the Privy Council of the House of Lords, announced today the council has dismissed with costs an appeal by the British Columbia Electric Railway Company against a Supreme Court of Canada ruling that certain company stocks held by non-residents of Canada were taxable in Canada.

Officials said detailed findings on the case, heard early this month, likely will be released next week. Decisions in other Canadian appeals heard at the last sitting of the Privy Council are not expected to be handed down until the Council reconvenes for its next session in October.

EXPERTS WOULD TAB ANTARCTIC WEATHER

SYDNEY, Australia, July 31.—(CP)—A group of scientists is using the establishment of meteorological stations in the Antarctic to assist short-term, and possibly introduce, long-range weather forecasting in Australia.

The group includes an Australian geologist, of the south magnetic pole, and one of the foremost authorities on Antarctica.

Mawson has already experimented in this direction. Under his direction, a meteorological station was set up on Macquarie Island to carry out observations while an Antarctic expedition was in progress before the end of the project was later abandoned.

Mawson and other scientists say that Antarctic stations would enable meteorological services in Australia to extend forecasts to cover from a week possibly up to three years.

They say such a service would greatly benefit Australia, as a primary producing nation. It would forestall the periodic droughts which are their worst enemy.

Establishment of the stations, they add, would present no political difficulties because they could be set up in Australian-administered
