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BONNET CALLED TO SOLVE POLITICAL CRISIS

LIVESTOCK BOARD ASKS TARIFF CHANGE

Prince Edward Island livestock producers in a meeting at Charlottetown last night petitioned the Dominion Government "to immediately suspend tariff duties on the importation of corn and corn feed products from the United States of America and the Argentine Republic." Because the 1937 grain crop was abnormally low the present supply of farm grains is "rapidly being depleted to a point where a serious situation will exist within the next few weeks, in fact does now exist in many localities throughout this province," the preamble to the resolution declared. It was in the "largest crop of hogs in twenty years is being fed and finished for market during the present winter and spring months." Hon. W. H. Dennis, Minister of Agriculture, told the meeting he had already communicated with Premier King and Hon. C. A. Dunning, Finance Minister, urging removal or reduction of tariff duties on corn. His action followed information as to the seriousness of the grain shortage in this Province, he

Whose gift of a thousand volumes to the Prince of Wales College made in appreciation of the Carnegie library movement throughout the province.

The magnificent gift of 1,000 volumes—a complete set of the famed Everyman's Library series of ancient and modern classics—has been received by Prince of Wales College from the Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, former Prime Minister of Canada.

The books, which are now being unpacked at the Carnegie Library headquarters, and are new from the publishers' hands, cover fiction, biography, poetry, drama, science, travel, essays, belles-lettres, translations from the Classics, references, oratory, romance, history, religion, philosophy and miscellaneous subjects.

The origin of Mr. Bennett's generous donation makes an interesting story. Last summer, on his visit here on the occasion of the Provincial Conservative convention, Mr. Bennett inspected Prince of Wales College in company with Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan. The Bennett Government having contributed \$28,000 towards the building cost of the institution, he was naturally keenly interested in inspecting the College, and he commended Dr. MacMillan very warmly on the success which had crowned the efforts of the MacMillan Government in providing so handsomely for the Province's educational requirements.

Express Concern

Currency Trading Banned

HULL REJECTS REICH PROTEST

Former U. S. Envoy Insulted Hitler Is Claim.

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) WASHINGTON, Jan. 14—State Secretary Hull met an official German protest against a bitter anti-Hitler speech by former Ambassador William E. Dodd today with an explanation that United States citizens enjoy the right of free speech.

Hans Heinrich Dieckhoff, the German Ambassador, visited the State Department to tell Hull that Dodd, who recently resigned from the diplomatic corps after five years as American envoy at Berlin, had insulted Hitler in an address in New York last night.

KINGSTON, Ont., Jan. 14—(CP)—Brigadier H. F. H. Hertzberg, C.M.G., D.S.O., M.C., whose appointment to command Military District No. 3 was effective Jan. 1, took over his office today. For four years he was here as general staff officer at the Royal Military College.

Four Drowned In Lake Simcoe When Car Plunges Through Ice

SUTTON, Ont., Jan. 14—Four members of a fishing party, three men and a woman, were drowned in Lake Simcoe late today when an automobile plunged through soft ice into 60 feet of water two miles off this fishing village. Two others, a man and a boy, escaped death.

The bodies were trapped in the car at the bottom of the lake. J. Nelson, the driver, broke the glass of a window and swam to the surface. Jack Wilkinson, 14, being pulled on a sleigh behind the machine, was not drawn into the water.

The dead, all from nearby Belhaven: Jack Bird; Mrs. Jack Wilkinson; Emmanuel Nelson and William Jones.

The party was proceeding over the ice seeking a favorable spot at which to fish through a hole. It was believed the car was being driven over planks laid upon soft spots in the ice when one rolled down, sending the machine skidding into the water.

It was thought that as the machine crashed through the ice the rope by which young Wilkinson's sleigh was being pulled snapped, saving the boy from falling into the water.

Efforts by Sutton authorities to recover the bodies were abandoned tonight until the morning when block and tackle will be erected at the scene in an effort to raise the submerged car.

Pictou Man Is Instantly Killed

PICTOU, N. S., Jan. 14—Herbert Hewitt, a native of England, was killed instantly at Central West River, near here, today when an emery wheel burst and a fragment struck him over the heart. It raised a welt five inches long and an inch wide.
