THE HOUSEWIFE AND HER ACTIVITIES

How many invalids have you at home? Probably dozens! Treasures damaged in accidents. That favorite vase in fragments. The chair with the broken leg.

Don't mourn their said state. Mend them!

Broken China — Clean all the pieces thoroughly. Be sure to get a good glue or cement. Carefully dry the broken pieces and select two that fit together. Apply a thin coating of glue to the edges of each, leave the glue to become nearly dry, and then press them firmly together.

Broken Furniture — Clean the wood thoroughly and warm it before applying the glue. There is longer any need to make your own glue, for several excellent fixatives for wood are sold at all stores.

Apply the glue thinly, and don't let it get too dry. While it is still tacky bring the broken pieces firmly together and bind them tightly with string, leaving them bound for a whole day.

Damaged Gilt Frame — These are easily mended by buying a little plaster of Paris, and mixing it with water in an old cup until it is of the consistency of putty.

Then apply it to the damaged frame and mould to the right shape. Brush over lightly with gold size, and then, while the size is still tacky, brush a little bronze powder over it.

With glue, plaster and patience, it is surprising how many treasures you can mend.

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
