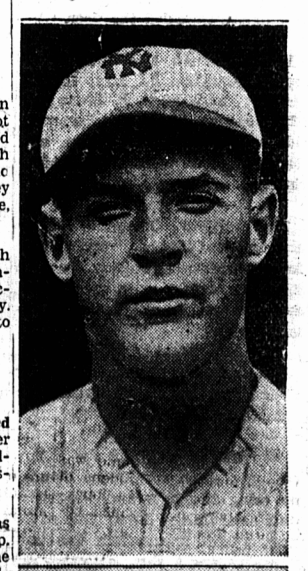

WINGS THE GREATEST SPECTACLE OF MODERN TIMES

The picture play "WINGS" in thick Charles Rogers and Richard Arlen, featured players in the picture which 125 planes, rise to a climax Arlen, featured players in the picture towards the end of the story, will be shown at the Strand Theatre. A few of the announced facts and figures concerning the manufacture of the drama included five of square miles of war trenches, barb-wire, shell holes, trucks, tractors, the battle of St. Mihiel is refought.
