Anchor's Late Rally Beats Millionaires In City League Game

Scoring five runs in the last half of the fifth inning, Freddie McCabe's West End Anchors last night put a crimp in the Millionaires' hopes of capturing a playoff spot when they defeated the third place squad 6-3 in a five and a half innings tussle. But while the defeat was bad, Millionaires still retain a slight mathematical chance of heading the Rovers providing they can win all their remaining games while Rovers are losing their one remaining encounter.

Millionaires started off on the right foot last night when single counters in the first three innings gave them a 3-0 lead but they fell victims to the winner's last gasp surge to see victory snatched from their grasp.

Two singles and a sacrifice gave the losers a counter in the first inning, Strain crossing the plate; With two away in the second Flynn poked out a double and then scored all the way from the keystone sack on a wild heave by the Anchor moundman. They accounted for their final run in the third as Strain got a life on an error.

McCabe went to second as the next batter was nicked by a pitched ball, advanced to third on McKinnon's single and raced in with his second run of the game as Connors was being thrown out at first.

Blanked by the smart hurling of Burke in the first three frames, Anchors' attack got underway in the fourth as they came through with three hits to score Ryan who had singled to start the frame. That was the end of that rally but the Westenders started all over again in the next frame. The first man was retired on a fly to anchor; McKennie was out in an error; Ryan got his second safe blow to send McKennie to third, the latter scoring on a wild pitch. Ryan came in with the tying run seconds later as Matheson scalped a long triple; that blow was the end for Burke.

Crockett came in to pitch and was greeted with a hard smash down the third base line by Perry. Matheson scoring as he beat the low throw to the plate and Perry getting on on the field; a choice and scoring as another wild pitch was uncorked. It gave the Anchors a 5-3 lead and just clinch matters Howatt getting in on a single, stole second and then came home on the third wild heave of the inning.

Fielding features of the game were turned in by Murphy and Strain, rival outfielders as they gathered in nice running catches from hard hit balls. Ryan, Matheson, Howatt and McKinnon were

the leading hitters with two safe blows each, Matheson's triple being the longest hit of the encounter.

R. S. Babcock Shoots Sparkling 77 In Second Round To Head Field

Putting together rounds of 85 and 77 for a two day total of 162 R.S. Babcock of the Halifax Ashburn Valley Country Club yesterday captured the Maritime senior golf title Holman Trophy, as he led a field of 123 by five strokes beating out W. Hart of the Arctostock Valley Club who wound up in fourth place with a total of 167. In third place was J. D. Hickman of Saint John's Riverside Club with 169 and Harry Seer of the Belvedere Club winding up in fourth place with a score of 171.

J. A. Helloffs another Charlottetown player was tied with M. M. Reed of Arctostock Valley in fifth place while three other players Powell of Chester, N.S., Norman of Ashburn and Gregory of Riverside were deadlocked in the sixth slot.

Going out in 39 and coming back in 38 the new champion who succeeds Percival Streeter of Saint John and who was a former pro with the Halifax Arctostock Club gave an outstanding display. Steadiness was a big factor in his victory and although he did slip up on a couple of holes a pair of birdies on the fifteenth and sixteenth saw him complete the incoming nine just one over par.

Hart, the Arctostock Valley veteran, was also in fine form his 33 yesterday being the second best score of the day. A co-holder of the leadership in the first day he shot good enough golf to win and he ran up against the long range driving and accurate putting of the new champion.

Battles for the next ten positions were exceptionally keen with the outcome being decided in many cases until the last shot had been made. Gordon Hughes of the local club in second place after the first day slipped somewhat yesterday but he had a birdie on the 18th hole nevertheless finished in a tie for seventh position while leading the second division golfers.

Hickman the other co-leader after the first day's firing wound up in third place while L.H. Norman another pre-tournament favorite finished in a three-way tie for sixth spot.

Greatly improved weather saw the majority of the golfers slash large amounts from their opening scores with competition also being much keener.

Gordon Hughes led the second division with a total of 178 with H.E. Crowell of Halifax Ashburn the runner-up. P. E. King of Liverpool was third in the third division followed by W. J. MacDonald of Riverside who captured a playoff from clubmate W. J. George on the fifth hole.

Another Ashburn golfer, P. Francis led the fourth division group with C.B. Chapman of Amherst in the second slot.

Arctostock Valley Club's M. M. Reed had the lowest net in the first division with J.D. Hickman of Riverside the runner-up.

Still another Ashburn golfer J. B. Goodwin had best net in the second division followed by clubmate J.W. Anderson.
