The provisional directors are: Mr. D. W. Carruthers, Montague; Mr. Alex. MacLeod, Montague; Mr. Daniel P. McPherson, Montague; Mr. J. M. McLean, New Perth; Provisional Secretary-Treasurer, J. D. McIntyre, M. D., Montague.

To give readers an idea of their plans and claims The Guardian publishes the following from their prospectus:

The Company offers for subscription eight hundred and eighty (880) shares at \$100 a share.

OBJECT OF COMPANY. This Company is formed for the purpose of breeding and raising the best strain of Island-bred Silver Black Foxes.

The original incorporators have purchased two acres of land, part of the farm of J. M. McLean, New Perth, which will be owned outright by the new company.

LOCATION OF RANCH. The ranch manager will be J. M. McLean, of New Perth, who has had several years of successful experience in breeding and raising foxes, and is possessed of the expert knowledge and practical experience so essential to the operation of a fox ranch.

THE ASSETS. The incorporators will hand over to the new company four pairs of the best Island-bred Silver Black Foxes. They are all bred from the Dalton, Oulton, Gordon and Tuplin stocks.

WHAT THE GUARANTEE MEANS. In fox breeding, the first year of the ranch is sometimes the critical one, owing to the inexperience of the manager, and the public often would prefer to invest their money in an old-established ranch, even though the stock be much higher priced than in a new one.

PROSPECTIVE PROFITS. The profits, independent of the guarantee, will of course depend on the number of pups born next year. According to expert opinion, the increase for four pairs of foxes might reach as high as twenty—a very conservative estimate would be twelve.

PERSONNEL AND EXPERIENCE OF THE COMPANY. J. W. Carruthers, Esq., the pioneer fox ranchman of King's County, is also Managing Director of the Smith Silver Black Fox Co., Ltd. He was the first to start a fox ranch in King's County, last Autumn he organized the Company into a joint stock company, retaining a large block of the stock himself.

THE PRICE OF STOCK AND PAYMENT. The stock of the Carruthers Silver Black Fox Company, Limited, is being sold at \$100 per share, 10 per cent on application and the balance on or before the 20th day of August next.

APPLICATION FOR SHARES. Application for shares may be sent to the Provisional Secretary-Treasurer, J. D. McIntyre, M. D., Montague, P. E. I., who will send a receipt direct to the applicant. Should the shares not be allotted, the money paid on them will be refunded in full.

EQUIPMENT OF CAR. (1) Whenever a person operating a motor vehicle shall meet on a public highway any other person riding or driving a horse or horses, or other draft animals, or any other vehicle, the person so operating such motor vehicle shall seasonably turn the vehicle to the left of the centre of such highway and pass without interference.

PENALTIES, &C. (1) The violations of the provisions of sub-section 5 of section 2 or of sub-section 7 of Section 2 or of Section 3 shall be deemed an offence under this Act and the person guilty thereof shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars for the first offence, and not less than fifty dollars, nor more than one hundred dollars or imprisonment not exceeding thirty days or both for a second offence and not less than one hundred dollars nor more than two hundred and fifty dollars or imprisonment not exceeding sixty days or both for a third or subsequent offence.

CHAUFFEUR REGISTRATION. (1) Every person hereafter desirous to operate motor vehicle as a chauffeur shall file in the office of the Secretary on a blank to be supplied by such Secretary, a statement which shall include the name and address and the trade name and motor power of the motor vehicle or vehicles he is able to operate, and shall pay a registration fee of \$2.00 and in addition as provided in Section 19.

CHAUFFEUR'S BADGE. (1) The Secretary shall forthwith upon such registration deliver to such chauffeur a badge of aluminum or other suitable metal which shall be oval in form and the greater diameter of which shall not be more than three inches and such badge shall have stamped thereon the words "Registered Chauffeur No. _____" with the registration number inserted therein which badge shall thereafter be worn by such chauffeur pinned upon his clothing in a conspicuous place at all times while he is operating a motor vehicle upon the public highways.

CHAUFFEUR TO PAY ANNUAL FEE. (1) No chauffeur shall drive a motor vehicle unless he shall have paid to the Secretary, in addition to the registration fee required under this law an annual fee of \$2.00.

CHAUFFEUR GETS ANNUAL RECEIPT. (1) The Secretary shall give to each chauffeur a receipt for this yearly tax which receipt is to contain the race, age, height, weight, color of eyes and hair of chauffeur and to be carried on the person of the chauffeur and produced upon demand.

SCHEDULE ANNUAL FEE MOTOR VEHICLES. (1) No motor vehicle shall be used or operated upon the public highways unless the owner shall have paid to the Secretary, in addition to the registration fee as set out in Section 19, a tax for the following schedule: 3. Thirty horse power but less than 40 horse power, twenty dollars.

(Continued from page 10) travelling in the opposite direction remains stationary, so long as it may be reasonable to allow such horse or animal to pass, and if travelling in the same direction, use reasonable precaution in thereafter passing such horse or animal, provided that in case such horse or animal appears badly frightened or the person operating such motor vehicle is requested to stop, such person shall cause the motor of such vehicle to cease running so long as may be reasonably necessary to prevent accident and ensure the safety of others.

(5) In case of accident to person or property, due to the operation of any motor vehicle, the person operating such vehicle shall stop and give such assistance as can be given, and shall, upon request of the person injured or any other person, give such person the name and address and, if not the owner, the name and address of the owner of such motor vehicle, together with the registered number thereof.

PASSING ON HIGHWAY. (1) Whenever a person operating a motor vehicle shall meet on a public highway any other person riding or driving a horse or horses, or other draft animals, or any other vehicle, the person so operating such motor vehicle shall seasonably turn the vehicle to the left of the centre of such highway and pass without interference.

ACTION FOR DAMAGES. (1) Nothing in this Act shall be construed to curtail or abridge the right of any person to prosecute a civil action for damages by reason of injuries to person or property resulting from the negligent use of a public highway by any person operating a motor vehicle.

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5. Fifty horse power and above, twenty-five dollars. The Secretary shall give a receipt to each owner on payment of this annual tax which receipt, containing a description of the motor vehicle as to be kept in the car and produced upon demand.

22. The Act 8th Edward VII, Chapter 13, entitled, "An Act to Prohibit the use of Motor Vehicles upon the Public Highways of this Province" is hereby repealed.

23. The Governor in Council shall have power absolutely to prohibit the running of motor vehicles on any public roads or highways or parts thereof which may be designated and fixed by Order in Council in manner to be prescribed by Order in Council, due notice whereof shall be given in the Royal Gazette.

24. The Governor in Council shall also have power to make such further regulations for restricting the use of the public highways by motor vehicles and for imposing such further conditions upon owners and drivers thereof as may be deemed advisable.

25.—Notwithstanding anything in this Act contained, no motor vehicles shall run or be operated on the Public Roads of this Province on Tuesday, Friday, Saturday or Sunday of each week.

26. This Act shall come into force from and after a day to be appointed for that purpose by a proclamation based upon an Order of the Lieutenant-Governor in Council and not sooner.

THE WEATHER THE TEMPERATURE TIDE, MOON ETC (Special to The Guardian) TORONTO, April 19.—Fresh south westerly to north westerly winds. A few local showers, but mostly fair and mild.

The temperature at three o'clock this morning by the Rexall Store tested thermometer with a northern exposure was thirty-five above and with a southern was thirty-seven above.

The moon sets tomorrow morning at 4.52 and Monday at 5.12. The full moon will be on Sunday, April 20th at 5.33 p. m.

The first quarter of the moon was on Monday, April 14th at 1.39 p. m.
