**Maritime M. P.'s May Be Reduced**  
OTTAWA, Feb. 23.—The event of a possible further curtailment of the representation in the House of Commons of the Maritime Provinces in the event of a redistribution is engaging the earnest consideration of Maritime members. In 1913 an amendment to the British North America Act provided that the representation in the Commons should not drop below that of the representation of the Senate. Both New Brunswick and Nova Scotia are entitled to ten senators and Prince Edward Island to four. Under the last redistribution New Brunswick was given eleven seats, Nova Scotia sixteen and Prince Edward Island four, and while the Island provinces representation cannot be further curtailed, it is probable that an increase in the population of Quebec without a corresponding increase in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia may result in the first province losing one representative and the latter six. This would bring the total Maritime representation down to 24 instead of 31 as at present.

Quebec is entitled to 65 seats and is the basis for the representation from the other provinces. The unit in Quebec is now approximately one member for every 33,000 of the population, and if this is increased to 40,000 is predicted without a corresponding increase in the other provinces, the maritime representation will have to come down. Observers state that in addition to the natural increase in the population of Quebec, many natives of that province, who emigrated to the United States have returned.
