The Markets

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 21—Fresh eggs were advanced two cents per dozen to the retail trade on the Montreal produce market today, bringing fresh extras up to 60 cents per dozen, firsts to 52 and seconds 38. Storage eggs remained unchanged from the previous week's quotation, as did other sections of the market. The cheese market was at a standstill, with prices ranging from 18 3/4 to 20 cents per pound, while butter remained at 38 3/4 to 39 for eastern townships no. 1 in a wholesale way, while to the retail trade solids sold at 41 cents and prints at 42. Quebec potatoes were quoted in carlots extract at \$1.52 to \$1.40, while New Brunswick green mountains sold from \$1.60 to \$1.75 per 90 lbs. in bulk, slightly lower than Saturday's quotation.

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 21—(Eggs)—Receipts of fresh eggs are very scarce on Canadian egg markets and as a result prices on this class are working higher.

TORONTO—The demand for fresh eggs on this egg market is far in excess of supplies and values there have advanced. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered, cases returned, extras 46-48, firsts 40-42, pullet asking 35, seconds 30. The present asking price for B. C. eggs is extras 58; firsts 54, pullet extras 45, f. o. b.

MONTREAL—This market continues firm under a scarcity of fresh egg supplies. Fresh eggs are selling to retailers at extras 60, firsts 52, seconds 38. Storage egg prices are extras 44, firsts 40, seconds 35.

WINNIPEG—Receipts on this market have declined further and paying prices have been revised sharply upward. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs, delivered, cases returned, extras 45, firsts 40, seconds 25. Storage eggs are now moving more freely into consumption.

VANCOUVER—There is a very acute scarcity of eggs on this market, with receipts far from sufficient to take care of the demand. Paying prices are unsettled, with the probability of a further advance shortly. Fresh eggs are selling to retailers locally at extras 60, firsts 57, pullet extras 51. Offers for carlots are reported from the east at as high as 62 cents f. o. b. Chicago spot unchanged futures 1-8 lower.

\$70,000 SHIPMENT FOR SWEDEN—Two hundred silver black foxes, valued at about \$70,000 arrived in Halifax on Saturday night for shipment to Sweden, where they will be used to stock ranches. The foxes brought from Prince Edward Island by B. Graham Rogers, will be shipped on the Grifphon, which is expected to arrive in Halifax this morning from New York. Mr. Rogers collected the animals from several farms on Prince Edward Island including his own. He has been shipping them for two years and for the lot to leave here today he will be paid an average of \$700 a pair. In three weeks he expects to have another lot ready for shipment. Mr. Rogers and two of his men arrived in Halifax with the foxes and spent the weekend here. One of the men will go to Sweden with the animals, which are in crates, two in each to see that they are well cared for.—Halifax Chronicle.

SPLENDID SHOW HERD OF HOLSTEINS GOES TO KINGSTON, ONTARIO

Mr. John Cole, chief showman for Hemlock Park Stock Farm, Mr. A. H. Fair, proprietor Kingston, Ontario, has recently completed the purchase of a show herd from different Holstein breeders in this province. This herd comprises twelve head, headed by Abbe Kirk Pontiac Pat, a very promising son of Paragon Pat XX and Jean Abbe Kirk Pontiac, who will shortly finish her third consecutive O. P. record on twice a day milking that will probably give her a world's record for that division for three consecutive years. This young bull was bred by Wilfrid Boyver, Bunsbury and is line bred having a double cross of this noted cow and has already been scored an X bull.

The females secured are equally good. From the herd of A. M. Agnew Craig-a-lee Farm, Charlottetown, who by the way assisted Mr. Cole in securing this herd, were the mature cow Franey Dina, a daughter of Patrick Franey Colanuthus and Dinaora IV (1150 pounds butter). Another good one is Craig-a-lee Dolly, who secured the junior championship for Mr. Agnew at Charlottetown, 1929. This youngster is sired by Dokter Bousfeldt Abbe Kirk and from Craig-a-lee Countess Dinaora. From the herd of Hon. W. M. Lea, Emily Daisy Pasch, Ist. at Charlottetown, a splendid quartette, daughters of Pontiac mondale, and Miss Ida Whilhelmima, a mature cow, daughter of Sir Ida Rooker Vale, were secured. A splendid quartette, daughter of Pontiac Cornucopia Prince were purchased from the herds of Walter and Roland Sunain, Rustico and Blair Andrews New Glasgow. These heifers are a very even lot that should be strong contenders in the get of sire classes and besides being good show material those in milk are putting up very creditable records. Victoria of Seaside will finish her three year old R. O. P., with well over 15,000 pounds milk and over 600 pounds butter. Other members of this herd were secured from Falcounwood Farm, Charlottetown, Cecil Stewart, Hampshire, Oswald Newson, Kingston, R. A. Proff, Freetown and Wilfrid Boyver, Bunsbury. This herd when fitted for show should add much to the laurels already won with Holsteins bred in the Garden of the Gull.

TRAFALGAR DAY AT THE ROTARY CLUB MEETING

Eloquent Address Delivered By Rev. W. Bruce Muir, The Speaker For the Day.

At the Rotary Luncheon yesterday the speaker was Rev. W. Bruce Muir who delivered the following address on "Trafalgar Day."

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,—

This is the third time I have had the honour of addressing the Rotarians of Charlottetown. The first time I had that honour conferred upon me I spoke to you on Citizenship; the second time I spoke to you I was asked to say something upon the national bard of Scotland. Today, being Trafalgar Day, I have been asked to speak to you upon that great event in our Empire's history. At the outset let me say there may seem no necessary connection between these very different themes. If, however, we pause for a moment we may recognize a sort of connection between them. We are citizens of the greatest Empire in the world; built not by saints and angels, but the work of men's hands; cemented with men's honest blood, and sometimes by a world in tears. It is thus that events like those of Trafalgar when seen in their true perspective enable us to see how that Empire has been built up. It was just in the revolutionary period preceding Trafalgar that Burns wrote and sang "And while we sing God save the king We'll not forget the people."

FINE COMEDY BILL AT THE PRINCE EDWARD

Victor McLaglen, Also J. Farrell McDonald, Former Student of Saint Dunstan's University.

Victor McLaglen, now firmly entrenched as a star of the first magnitude, believes that a comedy should be funny, fast, and bolstered up by a story. In his newest Fox Film, "Strong Boy" now at the Prince Edward, John Ford sees to it that all these qualities are skillfully injected and the result is most gratifying.

Abetted by a talented cast "Strong Boy" starts out in a railroad station and ends where it began—for it isn't necessary to look elsewhere for humorous situations and riotous tangles. McLaglen, cast as a burly baggage-smasher is in love with Leatrice Joy, the new girl. The one obstacle to the match is Victor's smug content with his job.

From the initial snag, things trip merrily along. A heroic act enables him to secure a promotion but he is satisfied to wear a white collar and take charge of the Lost and Found department and tag parcels. Troubles begin when a baby, a monkey and a pearl necklace get mixed up in his domain. A hilarious chase ensues with the entire station staff involved. Another promotion and he is fireman on the train of a touring Queen. Then there's a train robbery with a dash of heroics for a skillfully contrived climax.

Working hand in glove with our hero is a trinity of humorous geniuses of international repute. We refer to Slim Summerville, Clyde Cook and Tom Wilson.

These three comedians are certain relief for jaded nerves and a dormant sense of humor.

Farrell McDonald, a former student of St. Dunstan's University, who in the past has given many pleasant moments, is cast in a role which gives him wide scope in the matter of producing laughs.

Laurel and Hardy, the popular comedians, start the laughter in "The Laugh Grabbers." If you enjoy a good laugh don't miss this comedy program.

sovereignty of The God Whom he served and not to any merits of his own. With all his earthly imperfections he inspired affection as well as admiration and in the long list of our sea-kings Nelson towers head and shoulders above them all. For twenty six months before the battle of Trafalgar he never set foot on land. He hunted the enemy's fleet from Malta to the mouth of the Orinoco and back again to Europe. This he did with the relentless and untiring tenacity of a sleuth hound and during all that time he was brilliantly single-minded, unselfish and unswerving.

His only covetousness was that of Henry V. "But if it be a sin to covet honour I am the most offending soul alive." Nelson then is the greatest of our naval heroes. We feel this in the marrow of our bones, although we cannot so readily explain it. He is also in the eyes of the world, the one unrivalled thunderbolt that England has forged. We can boast of no more unquestioned genius, no truer patriot, no fire of higher ambition.

What a flood of emotion fills the soul of anyone who has stood on board the old Victory on the very spot where Nelson died! It is then easy to imagine the death scene as that immortal cockpit becomes peopled with the ghosts of battle and one sees it all. All the reek and tumult and raging mystery of the battle of Trafalgar rises before the mind and one recognizes that it was in such a scene that the great soul of Nelson passed to his reward. Today that old Victory will be wreathed in flags from stem to stern and thousands of people will again reflect upon the glories of the past and meditate upon those words of Britain's greatest admiral: "Kiss me Hardy," and with these words bade farewell to the British navy.

Gentlemen I feel sure you are all following with intense interest Mr. Ramsay MacDonald's visit to this great continent. His speeches both in the United States and Canada are models of diplomatic reserve, as diplomatic as any of the speeches of our great diplomatists of any period of our glorious history. It is not for me as a humble Presbyterian minister to presume to offer any criticism. I am however, deeply conscious as all of you must be, deeply conscious that there is another man in Britain at the present moment who is receiving the plaudits and eulogiums of every responsible paper in the old land and Philip Snowden has said: "Hither can we go and no further," and so while France is expending enormous sums upon the strengthening of her land fortifications the North Atlantic squadron of the British navy is finishing their autumn manoeuvres in the waters of Scapa Flow in the north of bonnie Scotland. Do not misunderstand then if I say that while I am as anxious as any man for the peace of the world, I am not going to be lulled into a feeling of false security by all the pacifist talk which is taking place today. We had the same kind of talk for forty or fifty years after the battle of Waterloo and yet the war clouds were gathering all the time. We will however continue to follow with increasing interest the developments which are taking place but we'll "never let the old flag fall." We will rather wish health and prosperity.

Outstanding amid all those heroes stands Lord Nelson, and on this Trafalgar Day it may be well to recall the prayer he inscribed in his diary before he hoisted his famous signal: "May the great God Whom I worship grant to my country and for the benefit of Europe in general a great and glorious victory, and may no misconduct in any one tarnish it and may humanity after victory be the predominant feature in the British fleet. For myself individually I commit my life to Him Who made me, and may His blessing light upon my endeavors for serving my country faithfully. To Him I resign myself and the just cause which is entrusted to me to defend. Amen. Amen. Amen."

In that prayer we recognize at once the secret of Nelson's greatness. He was by no means perfect as any one who reads his life's story may easily recognize. He may be perfect now, so that perfection is due to the
