No Discussion Till Blockade Lifted

LONDON, July 22—Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin today told the House of Commons it is "impossible" to open talks with Russia on German problems until the Berlin blockade problem is lifted.

He said the British Government is ready to discuss Berlin and other matters with the Soviet Government "as soon as the technical difficulties which have prevented normal communications with our sector of Berlin have been removed."

"It is impossible for a self-respecting government to sit down and discuss these things when your troops are cut off from normal communications and 2,500,000 people (in Western Berlin) are being used to put pressure upon you to come to a decision."

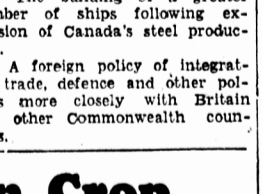
Mexico Decides To Revalue The Peso
