Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

Full sole tenant of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may secure a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency in the District. Entries by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency, but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Entries—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in part of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, or certain conditions. A desirable house is required, or one where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homestead in good stand may be secured by a quarter section of land by homestead. Price \$344 per acre.

Entries six months residence in part of three years, or living in part of three years, also for an extra cultivated or employment patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5 to per acre. Duties—must reside six months in each of three years, or 50 ac and acre-house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is used to reduction in size of rough, scrubby or stony and, live stock may be substituted for crop, under certain conditions.
