EDITOR'S MAIL.

Sir—It may not be generally known that the revenue furnished the P. E. L. R. by Prince County is more than double that of the other two counties, excluding Charlottetown. This being so, some are at a loss to assign a cause for our unjust treatment by the Railway authorities. A solution has been offered by a person who claims to be able to read the signs of the times. At the last Federal Election Mr. Lefurzey was elected by a substantial majority. The powers that be imagine that by such treatment as always referred to, Prince County may be coerced into reversing their verdict the first opportunity. The electors in this vicinity are of a contrary opinion. Nothing that has occurred since Confederation has served more to shatter the hopes of the Liberal Electors in this county than the shabby treatment meted out to them by the railway authorities. Another matter of surprise to fair-minded men, is that Tignish is not considered worthy of proper Railway accommodation. How is it that Tignish Depot, with a revenue of \$10,414.87, cannot obtain even a platform for the convenience of passengers, whilst Alberton, for instance, with a revenue of \$8,365.09, or \$1,549.18 less, has a new station, a new warehouse, a large water tank, and a concrete platform extending to the street? We do not envy Alberton her conveniences, by any means, but we want the people to know that there is "something rotten in the State of Denmark." The expenditure required for improvements at Tignish would not exceed \$150.00 and yet our petitions and entreaties go unheeded. Shame!! What about the indignation meetings proposed at the Board of Trade meetings at Alberton and Summerside? Surely there can be no petty scheme afoot to choke off public discussion?
