For an hour and a half Mr. Stewart spoke without pause. He brilliantly exposed the inconsistency, policy of the government which came into power upon promises they have since failed even to acknowledge, and took each plank of their pre-election platform and dealt with it in turn before launching out upon his criticism of the performance of the Government since coming into power. Mr. Stewart's following, speaking in defence of the government, and at 11 o'clock adjourned the debate. The afternoon session was taken up chiefly with discussion of a committee on the Nurses Registration bill, upon which progress was reported. The House adjourned until 10 a. m. this morning.
