## Oshawa Generals Take Second Game Of Junior Hockey Series By 4-1 Score

### Detroit Tigers Defeat St. Louis Browns 4-2

NEW YORK, April 18 (AP)—Home runs by Hank Greenberg and Charlie Gehringer enabled Detroit Tigers to beat St. Louis Browns 4-2 today for their first victory of the American Baseball League season. The game was at Detroit.

The team got seven hits but the long distance clouting of the Tigers decided the issue. Greenberg delivered his four-base smash in the first. In the sixth Hank tripled. Gehringer's circuit "b" came in the eighth with the bases empty.

At Washington, Boston Red Sox, with young Jim Bagby hurling five-hit ball, shut out Washington 7-0 for their second straight American League white-washing of the Senators.

Boston started off today on rookie slugger in the third inning. Doc Dramer singled Dom DiMaggio home. The Sox got three more runs in the fifth when Jimmy Fox hit his first homer of the year with two on.

Boston added a single run in the sixth. The last two Boston runs came in the seventh.

WINNIPEG, April 18 (CP)—Oshawa Generals capitalized on an early penalty to rush into a two-goal lead then coast to a 4-1 victory over Kenora Thistles here tonight in the second game of the Canadian Junior Hockey Final Series.

Juzia was serving a penalty when Bud McAtee scored the opening goal for the Generals and Kenora still was short-handed when Orville Smith made it 2-0 a moment later.

Oshawa struck again when Kenora received its next penalty. As Vince Jorgensen rested in the box, Ron Wilson raced in, carrying the puck on a power play. He picked up the rubber after pushing it through the defence and beat Charlie Rayner from close in.

Sawyer, hero of the first game, counted the fourth Oshawa goal in the second period and it was not until the third session that Thistles tallied for the first time in the series. Pinkie Melnyk scored after stealing a loose puck at the Oshawa blue line.

Thistles stepped on even footing with the husky Oshawa team in the centre ice zone but they seldom managed to get dangerous shots away as the Generals rear-guards moved back toward their own net, checking all the way. The Oshawa heavily used a body-check during the contest.

## 200 Runners Set For Boston Marathon Today; 13 Canadians Entered

BOSTON, April 18 (AP)—Near 200 distance runners—among them 13 Canadians—storm the tortuous hills that stretch from Little Hopkinton to Boston tomorrow in the Boston Athletic Association's 44th Marathon race.

Since form reversals seldom occur in this 26-mile, 385-year classic, it has been taken for granted by most of the entrants that this year's race will be a three-cornered tussle.

This favored trio includes Ellison (Tarzan) Brown of Westerly, R.I., the 25-year-old Narragansett Indian who set the course record of 2:28:51 4-5 last year; Les Pawson, the Pawtucket, R. I. alderman, also a two-time winner, and the 1939 runner-up, Don Heinicke of Baltimore.

Four other former winners are among the 194 entrants but only two of them, Walter Young, Verdun, Que., policeman, and Johnny Kelley of Arlington, Mass., are regarded as serious threats.

At 52, Clarence Demar, the seven-times winner, admits he will be satisfied to finish inside the first 20, and the even older Bill Kennedy of East Portchester, N. Y., who won back in 1917, makes no secret

of the fact that he enters this race every year for sentimental reasons.

The three remaining standouts are Robert (Scotty) Rankine of Preston, Ont., the Canadian Marathonist; Gerry Cole of Verdun, Que., who finished eighth last year, and Boston's Paul Donato, who placed sixth and fifth in the last two "grinds."

The forecast of rain and continued cold weather, ideal for the contestants, may help B-down make good his boast—that while becoming the first repeater winner since Demar in 1928, he will lower his own record.

## Glamorous Kid McCoy Of Boxing Fame Dies After Eventful Career

DETROIT, April 18 (AP)—In the quiet of a hotel room a peaceful death came today to Norman Seby, the glamorous Kid McCoy of the boxing ring whose amazing life story would have been labeled fantastic fiction if its chapters had been woven into a novel.

McCoy, who did more and saw more in his 66 years than the average man dares dream about, died from either an overdose of sleeping medicine or poison, according to Dr. Lyle C. Ling, deputy coroner.

Hobo and millionaire sportsman; dishwasher and social lion; claimant of the world's middleweight title and convict; owner of an exclusive New York jewelry store and bankrupt; movie actor and saloon porter; auto racer and confidante of Maurice Maeterlinck, the poet and mystic; hero of a short story classic by Charles Harding Davis and demonstrator of a new-fangled health suspender—these descriptions all fitted the Kid, who was married nine times, three times to the same woman.

A note left by McCoy said: "I can no longer endure this world's madness."

As a boxer McCoy boasted a devastating punch but a good many of his victories were scored by his cunning. The stories of how he outwitted his foes are legion and a good many of them certainly do

not picture the Kid in the most favorable light. In later life McCoy claimed that many of these tales were exaggerated although he admitted that he had distracted opponents by telling them their shoe laces were untied and by other ruses.

McCoy spent his last years in Detroit in a motor company guard, obtaining the job when he was paroled from San Quentin Prison where he served a term for homicide in connection with the death of Mrs. Theresia Mors of Los Angeles.

He always denied his guilt, saying the woman killed herself in his presence.

He claimed the world middleweight title in 1896 after defeating Tommy Ryan, the champion. During his career he won 75 bouts, lost six, including knockouts by Jim Corbett and Tom Sharkey, drew nine times and engaged in 13 no-decision fights.

"The Real McCoy," an expression indicating genuineness, has been attributed to the Kid. In McCoy's fight days while the Kid was in New York another boxer used the same Kid McCoy ring name in San Francisco. Indicated by this McCoy went to the Pacific coast and upon arrival was inducted to a group of ring enthusiasts as "The Real McCoy."

He was born in McCoy, Ind. The widow of his father, who directed that all his possessions be left to her.

## Regulations On Sport In England To Be Relaxed

LONDON, April 18 (CP Cable)—British sports circles were cheered today by the Government's announcement that restrictions affecting football and racing during wartime had been revised. Effective immediately larger crowds will be admitted to soccer games and racing fixtures will be more numerous.

Attendance at football matches have been severely cut down since the start of the war through anti-crowd regulations and race meetings severely curtailed.

The home office issued today attendance at English war cup competition matches would be permitted up to 50 per cent of the capacity of the grounds. Previously grounds with accommodation for 60,000 persons were allowed to admit not more than 15,000 spectators.

Many additional racing fixtures are authorized for June, July and August. At least six tracks where there has been no racing since the outbreak of the conflict have been authorized to resume racing.

The Royal Ascot meeting, most fashionable of English race meets, will be held at Newmarket June 21-22. The Ascot course will not be available.

## Shipping Companies To Carry On

TORONTO, April 18 (CP)—Ten major Great Lakes shipping companies prepared tonight to start immediate operation of their vessels despite the Canadian Seamen's Union strike which has tied up navigation on the lakes since Sunday night and stalled the opening of the 1940 season.

In a final effort to reach a settlement, representatives of the companies met late this afternoon with union officials and M. C. Campbell, chief conciliation officer of the federal labor department, but negotiations broke down and the companies decided to start operations in defiance of the strike.

The parity snagged on the inability of the companies and the union to compromise their proposals. The union insists on its demand for \$10 a month increase in wages with one additional man on each ship while the companies stood firm by their last proposal for a \$7.50 a month increase with an additional point of dispute placed before a federal conciliation board.

Meanwhile, last year's league champions were pecking at Claude Passeau for eight safeties, out at a time except in the eighth-inning scoring rally.

## Notes For Women Under Fire In Quebec House

QUEBEC, April 18 (CP)—After a spirited attack by opposition leader Maurice Duplessis, a government bill granting women the right to vote in provincial elections and to be eligible as candidates for the Legislature today received third reading in the Legislative assembly.

Sponsored by Premier Adolphe Godbout, the measure is subject to ratification by the Legislative Council, provincial Upper House. In the lower house it passed in second reading by a vote of 67 to 9 and the division held on final reading.

## Vancouver Garage Owner Recalls Winning Boston Marathon 30 Years Ago

VANCOUVER, April 18 (CP)—A gray-haired Vancouver garage proprietor knocked off work long enough today to recall the day 30 years ago when he won the Boston Marathon under an 85-degree sun.

Freddy Cameron's reminiscences were prompted by the fact that another Vancouver man, Roy Palmer, will be in the pack which starts the annual marathon at Boston tomorrow.

Cameron was 22 years old and had been distance running only a year when he left his machinist's job in Amherst, N. S., to enter the marathon April 19, 1910. He took a lead almost at the start and was never headed, covering the 26-mile course in two hours 23 minutes and 52 seconds. He lost 7 1/2 pounds doing it.

"At the 10-mile mark I was fresh as a daisy," Cameron recalled. "Then I knew I was going to be all right. If you can do the first 10 okay, you stand a fair chance. But you've got to hold plenty in reserve for the last five. That's the tough part of the race."

Cameron quit running in 1920 and came here three years later.

## U. S. Votes Increase In Naval Building

WASHINGTON, April 18 (AP)—The United States Senate today gave a thumbs-up endorsement to faster naval construction, voting 68 to 4 to approve navy expenditures of \$963,797,478 in the fiscal year beginning July 1.

The measure, containing funds to start work on two new battleships and 471 warplanes, among other units, won quick passage.

Chairman David Walsh of the Senate Naval Affairs Committee said it was the smallest vote against a naval supply bill he had seen in 20 years in Congress.

The measure now goes back to the House of Representatives which originally voted a \$965,779,438 bill. The measure carried \$1,700,000 to start work on the new battleships, expected to be of 50,000 tons or more. Also listed in the new ship category were one aircraft carrier, two cruisers, eight destroyers, six submarines and five auxiliary vessels. Additional appropriations were made to carry forward work on eight battleships, seven cruisers, two aircraft carriers, 42 destroyers, 20 submarines and 18 auxiliary ships now building.

The ret red distance runner whose Olympic record is an athletic legend, said that when some boy 14 years old today, comes along about 1950 with that accomplishment it will not be a great surprise because before then there will be 4.03, 4.02 and 4.01 profane "freaks" who will run against Don Lash Sunday for the Finnish relay fund.

"It's foolish to consider the four-minute mile beyond the limit of human possibilities," he said.

## Commons Ask Action Against "Fifth Column"

LONDON, April 19 (Friday)—(CP)—The Daily Mail reported today that 70 members of the House of Commons have asked the Minister of Home Security, Sir John Anderson, to take firm action against "fifth column" elements in Britain—subversive groups seeking to undermine the country to the advantage of its enemies.

In an editorial entitled "disquiet about Britain's fifth column is growing," the newspaper said it was fully supported by public opinion in demanding action against such factions.

"The people ask that doubtful enemy aliens should be immediately interned and all other aliens strictly examined," the newspaper said. "They want the necessary steps to be taken against Communists, peace cranks and other unpatriotic bodies whose anti-British propaganda and anti-war works are sabotaging the British effort."
