Dividend payments by the railways paying dividends were reduced from \$58,890,927 in 1930 to \$27,247,990 in 1932, the Canadian Pacific Railway paying \$26,190,030 of this amount. The Canadian National Railway closed the year with a deficit of \$99,275,680, including the loss of the Eastern Lines; and all profit and loss items made during the year and the Canadian Pacific Railway had a deficit of \$19,242,977 after paying dividends sinking and reserve charges, etc.
