### Fox and Fur Notes



Mr. Rancher:—You may be one of those who either have been unfortunate, and have not made much out of the Fox Business, or you may have started in and as you do not feel that you can afford to take stock in the Fur Selling Association. Let us consider your difficulty, and the first point to settle is, do you want to continue in the business? If you do, then you must make sure of the future. It is no use for you to start in raising foxes unless you are reasonably sure of a continuing stable market for your fox pelts.

The production of fox furs is overtaking the demand, and unless the demand is increased and the market enlarged, one of two things will happen, either we will have to produce less foxes or sell pelts for a lesser price. If we do not want either of these alternatives, then it is up to us to enlarge our markets, and this can only be done by advertising.

Now you may think that you can't afford to so invest your money for the purposes contemplated by the Fur Selling Association, but the fact is, that you cannot afford NOT to so invest. You may say, "Well, let those who have done well do the advertising." That is all very well, but if you do not do it, how do you think the others do it, how do you think it is going to help you? This is a point that must be noted and remembered, and only those who will be members of the Fur Selling Association will benefit from the advertising that will be done by the Association. You may ask, "Why?" Because the Association is going to grade and classify its furs and TRADE MARK them, then it will advertise these furs under its trade mark, and create a demand for the trade marked article. This being so, the buyers will naturally stock the fur that is in demand, and not a fur that has not been so advertised. IF YOU ARE NOT A MEMBER OF THE ASSOCIATION, YOU CANNOT HAVE YOUR FURS SO TRADE MARKED, and consequently cannot share in the results of the advertising.

Again you may say, "Well, I'll wait awhile and see how you get along." In other words you are willing to let the other fellow do the work and establish the market and when this has been done you will want to come in and reap the benefits.

Are you quite certain that when success has been attained, and when your money is no longer necessary to the Association, that you will be let in? Let me put it in this way—Suppose a number of men decide to go into an undertaking which requires a great amount of capital, and they offer you the opportunity to join and put up their share of the money required, and you say, "I'll wait until they come to me." Now if the undertaking is a success, and the other fellow's money is no longer necessary, are the men who started the undertaking and made it a success, likely to let the others who would not join at first, come and share in the success? It is not reasonable to expect that by many in order to make it light on those bearing it. If you, as one interested, refuse to co-operate, and bear your share at the start, then do not be disappointed, if later when your help is no longer necessary, you are refused admission to the Association.

The door is open now. You are invited to come in. If you refuse the invitation, then you will only have yourself to blame, if later you find the door closed.

Mr. Rancher, this Association is for you, in your own interest, to protect your industry and its future. For your own sake we ask you to become a shareholder. We are not trying to force you in, nor do we beg. It is a business proposition, for business men are conducted in a business like way. We regard great things for its shareholders, we believe that those who stay out will make a mistake which they will regret later.

Mr. Rancher, think it over, but think quickly. There is only a limited number of shares which will go to those who apply first. The man who waits takes the advantage of it. This is not a stock jobbing proposition but a legitimate enterprise for the purpose of forwarding and protecting the fur industry. There is a splendid

Copies of the United States note to Italy, it was said today at the State Department, have been delivered to the representatives of the Allied and associated governments and distributed to all the news columns of the world promising its widest dissemination even in Russia itself. Diplomats generally regarded the document as having a three-fold purpose, first, the extension of moral support to the Polish Government and people, second an appeal to the masses in Russia to throw off the Bolshevik yoke and establish a constitutional government, third, the influencing of other nations to refrain from recognition of the Soviet regime. The despatch of the note to Italy followed a series of informal conversations that had been in progress for several weeks between officials of the United States, States Department and the Italian Embassy.

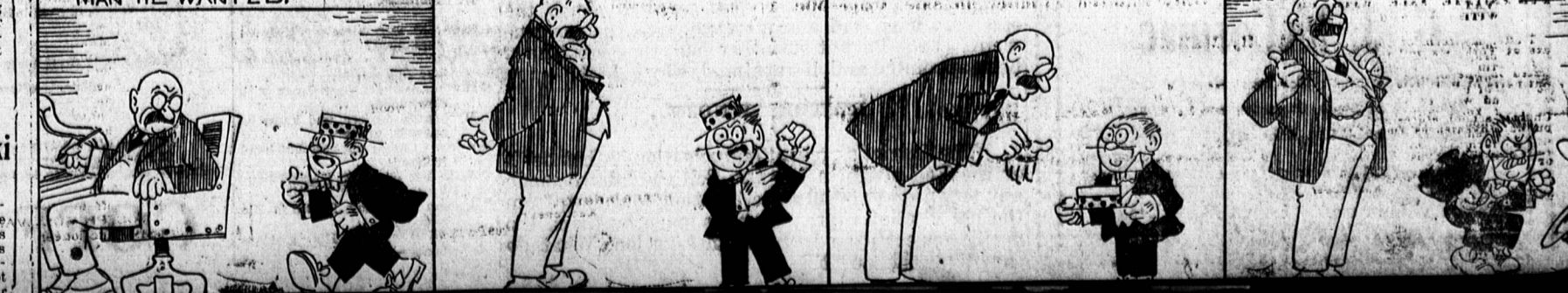
