Girls' and Boys' Hobbies exhibition. The Board of Directors related to this undertaking met three times during the month and plans for the Exhibition, which will be held from Monday to Friday, May 3rd to the 7th, are well under way.

Boys' Manual Training Class. The attention at this class throughout the month was well maintained and the splendid work being done in this Hobbycraft will be shown in exhibits now being prepared by members of the class for the Hobbies Exhibition.

Junior Boys' Stamp Club. Under the leadership of Mr. E. V. Bell, interest in our Junior Boys Stamp Club is being well maintained.

Boys' Sunday Morning Fireside Group. Interest has been maintained among a group of boys in connection with our Sunday Morning Fireside Group, meeting from

Intermediate Girls' Group Rally. The Intermediate Girls held one after-gymnasium group rally during the month, on which occasion Mrs. Percy Gullison gave a talk on "The Care of the Hair, Skin and Hands".

Business Girls' Supper Rally. During the month the members of the Business Girls' Class held a supper party in the Reading Room of the Association Building and spent an early evening period in music and informal discourse around the fireside. The details in carrying through this event were in charge of the Director of Girls' Work—Miss Lella C. Worthing.

Young People's Sunday Evening Services. These services, under the joint direction of the Student Christian Movement of Prince of Wales College and the Y. M. C. A., were held during the month in Central Christian Church, in Zion, at St. Peter's Cathedral and in Hertz Memorial Hall.

Young People's Choral Rehearsal. The Young People's Choir assisting in the Sunday Evening Song Services met at the Y. M. C. A. each Saturday night during the month for rehearsal under the direction of Mrs. Frances Holl.

Girls' and Boys' Community Night Programmes. About 100 girls and boys were in attendance on their Friday evenings of the month from 7.00-8.00 and the capacity attendance in the Social Room each night speaks for the interest which is taken in the Canadian Educational films which are sent to us by the Park's Department of the Canadian Government.

Educational Tutorial Group. Mr. George Hart of Prince Street School met with a couple of students on two nights of the month, giving them help in Mathematics, English Composition and Grammar.

Meeting of Ministerial Association and Representatives from Board of Directors. Another conference was held during the month between representatives of these two groups for the purpose of studying ways and means whereby a closer cooperation may be effected between the churches of our city and the Y. M. C. A. The latter group made certain specific recommendations which were considered at this meeting and which were referred to the Ministerial Association for its study. It was agreed that the Ministerial Association might wish to add recommendations to the list of those submitted, and it was decided to have a further conference following a meeting of the Ministerial Association.

Trinity Church Young People's Union. Our Association was privileged during the month to accommodate the Young People from Trinity Church on a couple of occasions. A group of about twenty came to the building on Tuesday evenings for recreation in bowling and group games following the regular weekly meeting of their Society at Trinity Church. ized People's Work of our churches. Church Boys' Groups. Through-out the month of February again our Association re-erred Thursdays from 7.30-8.30 P. M. for group activities for boys from the organized clubs of our various churches. The four periods of the month were under the direction of Y. M. C. A. leadership and, while the attendance has not yet become large, it is believed this period can be made of great value in promoting the organized mid-week activities of church groups. On the four evenings of the month there was a total attendance of twenty-eight (28) boys present.

Meetings of outside organizations. We were pleased during the month to provide accommodation in our building for the Annual Meeting of the Charlottetown Insurance Company and for meetings of the P. E. I. Temperance League. The Association continues extending its services to the News Boys of the Halifax Herald, and thirty-one (31) boys were present at the four Saturday periods from 12.30-1.30 P. M.

Hi-Y Grads Club. During the month the Club held four meetings with Mr. Walter Fowler of the Canadian Airways as the special guest speaker on one occasion. The other three meetings of the month were given over to the discussion of Club business.

Y's Mens' Club. The Y's Mens' Club held four Thursday evening supper-meetings during the month. After the regular business meeting of the month the three following guest speakers featured the programmes:

1. Mr. E. L. Miles—"The St. Lawrence Waterways Project"

2. Rev. George Gillespie—"A Glimpse at life among the Eskimos"

3. Mr. Douglas Henderson, Provincial Secretary of the Boys Scout Association—"Some Phases of Scouting"

Bowling. During the month twenty (20) different teams participated in the organized league bowling programme of the Association and, in addition, quite a large number of participants took part in the casual bowling from day to day. The records of the bowling alleys show 694 league games for the month and 1514 games bowled by casual patrons.

TOTAL DAILY ATTENDANCE AT Y. M. C. A. BUILDING

From time to time the question has been asked, "What is the total attendance in the course of a day at the Y. M. C. A. Building?" A great many of our friends perhaps hardly give the matter a thought and from comments received we have reason to believe that our estimates, generally, greatly underestimate the frequency of attendance at our Association Building. We are prone to accept simply as a matter of course the services of any institution which year in and year out carries on its work with limited publicity.

On Thursday, the 17th day of December last, between the hours of 9.00 A. M. and 10.00 P. M. An actual count was taken of the number of persons entering the Association Building. The total for the day was 343, and on Friday, February 26th, a second definite check was made for the same hours of the day. The total attendance on the date of February's count was 318.

While it is impossible to establish a strictly authentic record of average daily attendances from the results of such a limited survey as has been made, it may be safely

affirmed that figures given indicate somewhat less than average attendances.

PHYSICAL TRAINING IN PRINCE STREET SCHOOL. Last fall an approach was made to our Board of Education through our Physical Department Committee, suggesting the need of Physical Education and Training in our city schools. It was pointed out that the services of the Physical Directors of the Y. M. C. A. would be available for certain morning periods of the week or the Association would be glad to make available facilities in our gymnasium for teachers or classes which might come to us from the schools. The matter was referred to the principals of the schools for their consideration and, in due course, an invitation was received from the principal of Prince Street School for our Physical Directors to meet the various classes at Prince Street for certain setting-up exercises each week.

Starting with Wednesday, February 24th, Miss Worthy met 17 classes on Monday and Wednesday mornings. The total enrollment in these classes is approximately 650 pupils.

Starting from the date of March 1, Mr. W. A. Henry has taken charge of the upper half of the school, while Miss Worthy has continued giving instruction to the nine lower grades.

Finances. Up to date of Feb. 28th, 1937, the sum of \$4156.50 or 88.1 per cent of the 1936 campaign subscriptions amounting to \$4714 has been collected. At the same date a year previous 92.2 per cent of the campaign subscriptions for 1935 had been collected. On general account receipts for the month amounted to \$521.13 and expenditures to \$582.57. Accounts on hand for payment to totalled \$1243.39 and outstanding pledges amounted to \$471.50.
