### WHY DO FARMER'S SONS LEAVE THE FARM.

This question has been so often asked and so much discussed that it is difficult to say anything new upon it, and yet it is a matter vital to the welfare of the farming community. The farmer's son grows on the soil and trained in all kinds of farm work and farm management, make the best farmer. And there is inevitable loss in leaving a calling which he has learned to so acquire himself with another calling that he can live by it and follow it successfully. There is obviously the same loss of valuable time as if a young man who had first learned the carpenter trade after years of apprenticeship were to learn the trade of blacksmith. Yet despite such inevitable loss young farmers will leave their first calling for another.

It is therefore, as Grover Cleveland was wont to say, "a condition and not a theory which confronts us." And before an adequate remedy can be provided the cause must be sought out and as far as possible removed. Why do young farmers seek other callings? The causes are many. In some cases the parents or one of them, prefer that the son or sons shall follow some calling which they think less laborious, or more genteel than farming. In some cases the son makes the choice for himself, on like grounds. In nearly every case, where the young man so chooses for himself he makes a false estimate of the supposed hardships of farm life and an equally delusive estimate of the ease and supposed gentility of the merchant's or the professional man's mode of making his living.

More than usual heat and some regrettable strenuous language was exchanged across the floor of the Legislative Chamber about midnight of Thursday's session. A telegraphic despatch states that the Toronto Globe puts forward the proposal that Canada shall expend \$10,000,000 in building a Dreadnaught. This would be to follow the example of Australia, which is providing a fleet of its own. The feeling grows that Canada should bear some share in the cost of her own naval defence, if not in the defence of the Empire at large, and that in providing for a land force without making any provision for the defence of our ports, our coasts and our commerce our ways are strangely unequal.

Lord Strathcona, who is a man of peace is willing to give \$10,000 a year, we know not for how long to promote military drill in the Canadian schools. He evidently does not think such training will foster a blood thirsty spirit.

Judging from the little that comes by wire from Ottawa the Parliamentary session seems to be passing in a singularly quiet and uneventful fashion. There is a dearth of all the shocking and surprising elements which marked the closing session of the last Parliament. Happily there are no serious charges being made, and this so far has not been a "scandal session."

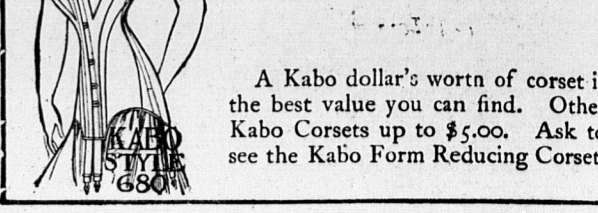
