Chaplin's Film Took \$4,000,000

(By The Canadian Press) MOLLYWOOD, Oct. 13.—The returns on Charlie Chaplin's film, "Modern Times", released 21 months ago, have "dwindled" to \$3,000 a week. Alf Reeves, who was an actor with Charlie in 1910 and has been his business manager since 1918, is the authority for the figure. Reeves says Charlie's end of "Modern Times"—with United Artists' 25 per cent distributing charge deducted—will be about \$3,000,000. The film cost \$1,250,000. "City Lights", the previous Chaplin film, brought in nearly \$4,000,000 and Alf says he and Charlie were confident the latest picture would better this figure by at least \$500,000. MIGRATION CONFERENCE CONCLUDES

Central Statutory Authority Proposed To Examine Schemes For Empire Development.

BY GEORGE HAMBLETON Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON, Oct. 13.—(CP Cable)—A. A. Somerville, chairman, closing the Empire Migration Conference tonight, pointed out that the purpose behind the proposed central statutory authority was to have a non-political body which, comprising the best brains, would be able to examine Empire development and settlement schemes expertly and honestly.

These schemes would not necessarily be land settlement. They might include harbor facilities, land communications, the development of fisheries, and the stimulus of secondary industries overseas within the terms of the Ottawa agreements. What was aimed at was not a piecemeal cure for unemployment but a great effort that, "realizing what the British Empire is, what its possibilities are, and that we are strong enough and rich enough, will not wait upon circumstances but will compel them."

"Our great purpose is to keep the British Empire the British guardian of peace and of the liberties of mankind," Mr. Somerville added. Major Howard, formerly of Vancouver, suggested the possibility of approaching the British Columbia Government with a view to taking over a stretch of territory north of the new railway line from the Rockies through to the Pacific coast. He suggested something in the nature of the old Hudson's Bay Company might be tried under the care of the British Government. An area might be reserved for British settlement for a long period of years and be given the name "Britannia."

The conference, which meets again during the Glasgow Empire Exhibition next year, decided, pending establishment of a statutory authority by the government, to appoint a committee to examine concrete plans for empire migration developments. The committee, which was given power to add representatives from the Dominions, will consist of C. G. Armon, M.P., Lord Mansfield, Brig-General John Nation, and A. A. Somerville, M.P.

Busmen Probe Strike Leads

(By The Canadian Press) LONDON, Oct. 13.—Reverberations of the strike of 25,000 London busmen around Coronation time are still being heard. A full delegate conference of the busmen has demanded the Executive Council of the Transport Workers' Union reconsider the expulsions and the suspension of strike leaders from the Union. They suggested a ballot vote on whether the membership was satisfied with the executive council's handling of the dispute and whether the busmen desire the full reinstatement of the expelled and suspended leaders who were members of the Central Bus Committee.

Trade Of Empire Shipped British

(By The Canadian Press) LONDON, Oct. 13.—The value of Empire trade in British shipping is shown by the fact 94 per cent of Britain's imports from the Empire and more than 88 per cent of her exports were carried in British ships. The Daily Express has pointed out. The newspaper adds that foreign ships last year carried nearly half the foreign imports to Britain and more than a third of her exports to foreign countries. New Zealand took all Britain's exports and sent 99.9 per cent of her exports to Britain in British ships. At the other extreme, Finland, with a visible trade balance of \$22,500,000, distributed only 20 per cent of this to British ships.

Franco - Yugoslavia Pact Is Renewed

PARIS, Oct. 13.—(CP-Havas)—France and Yugoslavia have renewed for a five-year period, beginning next Dec. 2, their treaties of friendship and conciliation signed in Paris Nov. 11, 1927. The formalities were effected yesterday by Milan Stojadinovich, Yugoslavia's Premier and Foreign Minister, and the French Foreign Minister, Yvon Delbos. The two statesmen also "proceeded on this occasion to a penetrating study of the general European situation and the problems which more particularly concern Yugoslavia and France in the spirit of close collaboration which corresponds to their deep feelings and united interests," according to an official communique issued after their meeting.

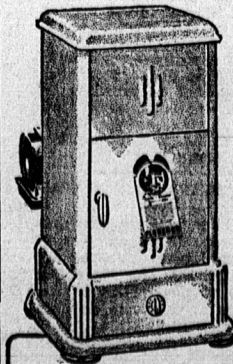
