### Contract Bridge

#### ALERT DEFENSE

A certain defender was very much more alert than his adversary in today's deal, played at match-point duplicate.

West dealer.  
North-South vulnerable

♠ A K 7 3 2	♥ 5 3	♦ K J 8 7	♣ 8 6 4
♠ 8 6 4	♥ A K	♦ J 8 6 5 3	♣ 2
♠ Q J 10 9	♥ 10 9 8 7 6 5 4	♦ A 10 6 2	♣ 7 4

This was the bidding at five of the eight tables:

West 3	North 4	East 4	South 4
Pass	Pass	Pass	Pass

Invariably, the opening lead by West was the spade queen, and four of the declarers made their slam. Three of them properly ducked the opening lead in dummy and ruffed in their own hand; then led a trump. When West showed out, the heart ace was put up, the clubs were cashed, and then a high spade was led from dummy. East could ruff with his high king or not—he was sooner or later put in with that card, and his diamond return to the combined North-South tenace allowed these declarers to avoid the loss of a diamond trick. If East had returned a club, it would have brought the same result, since the declarers could have discarded a diamond from dummy while ruffing in their own hand.

Another South made the contract in slightly different fashion—but he did not deserve to! He won the first trick in dummy with the spade king, then led a low spade. When East discarded a club, South ruffed and returned a heart toward dummy. West's "refusal" made matters clear, and this declarer then stripped the club and made the throw-in play in trumps.

At one table, however, the same faulty technique by the declarer met its just dessert! When the trick was taken in dummy with the spade king and a low spade was returned, East gave the matter profound thought—and then ruffed in with the heart king! Since he exited with complete safety at that point, the South ended up by losing a diamond trick in addition to the heart.
