**THREE ELECTIONS.**

The three general elections in which within a few days the electors of Newfoundland, Canada and the United States took part, resulted in each case in sweeping victories for the governments of the day. Bond, Laurier and Roosevelt were all popular leaders, and the element of personal popularity is an important factor in the make-up of a successful political leader. Beyond question the three leaders of the Republican and Liberal parties possessed a more general and more intense popular favor than was shared by the opposition leaders.

The questions at issue were various. In Newfoundland and Premier Bond's victory appears to be mainly a verdict against union with Canada. The tariff issue was not particularly prominent in the Ancient Colony but so far as it figured in the contest the result shows that the people prefer the low tariff of Newfoundland and to the higher tariff of Canada. In the United States the Republican party stands for high protection and its triumph may be regarded as another endorsement of that principle. In Canada the Liberal party opposes high protection and the popular verdict must be read as indicating that the present tariff is high enough.

**JAPAN'S MODEST ATTITUDE.**

Baron Hayashi, the Japanese Ambassador in London has given out the following statements:—

"After the fall of Port Arthur Japan would, I believe, be ready to treat for peace on no higher essential basis than that Russia should evacuate Manchuria. Japan also agreeing to a similar evacuation."

"The two great difficulties in the way of any suggestion of peace are, first, the apparent opposition of Emperor Nicholas's present advisers to a settlement of any kind; second, the preservation of Russian prestige. When a nation's prestige, if not gone, is severely impaired, it is a difficult matter, even with the best of intentions, to preserve it."

The position thus taken by Japan is an exceedingly modest and reasonable one. Russia was bound in the most solemn manner to evacuate Manchuria. She delayed, prevaricated, and finally fixed October 8, 1903 as the date upon which she would remove her armies and hand over Manchuria to China. That date came and passed and no beginning was made toward evacuation. The refusal by Russia to keep her treaty obligations forced Japan to draw the sword. Japan after all her struggles and victories now asks no more than at the beginning of the war. She thus throws upon the Czar the full responsibility for the continuance of the war and all the bloodshed and misery that must follow. We believe that history will render a like verdict.

Congratulations to Judge Blanchard of the County Court of King's County.

Both the Provincial leaders, Premier Peters and Leader Mathison of the Opposition, have laid down their platforms, the former in a manifesto to the people and the latter in his speech at Georgetown. The Premier's manifesto fills four columns of the Patriot. Neither of the two deliverances contains much that is new outside of what has been before claimed for their respective parties or charged against their respective opponents.

The esteemed Examiner had not hitherto given much, by the way of editorial opinion or comment on the war, but in its latest issue makes amends by the following remarkable news item and sagacious view of the situation. We quote:

"Russian advices state that General Kurapatkin was killed on the 4th of October. If this report be true, the Japanese have suffered a very great loss, accounting in part perhaps, for the quietude of the past month at the front."

The Russian commander has been subjected to a good deal of severe criticism during the war, but this is the unkindest cut we have so far noticed.

**TRADE DEPRESSION IN ENGLAND.**

There is now a severe industrial depression in Great Britain. At a recent meeting of the London overseers of the poor it was stated by the President of the Local Government Board that conditions were worse than had been previously known there in half a century. He declared that "extraordinary measures must be taken to give work or aid to the idle, and urged that as the laws of political economy had been broken to relieve starving Ireland they must now be broken to relieve starving London. It was urged that a session of Parliament be called to deal with the situation, which seems to be about as bad in such industrial centres as Glasgow and Manchester as in London. Complaints of the slack condition of trade in the middle and north of England are general.

It seems that this is an extension of the wave of depression that swept over Germany in 1903 but which was held off for the time in the British Isles by the activity incident to the war in South Africa. Last year the depression began to be seriously felt in England, and the number of unemployed greatly increased last winter. Matters are now much worse, and the advocates of protection are not slow to point out that a free trade policy cannot longer meet the requirements of the British Isles.

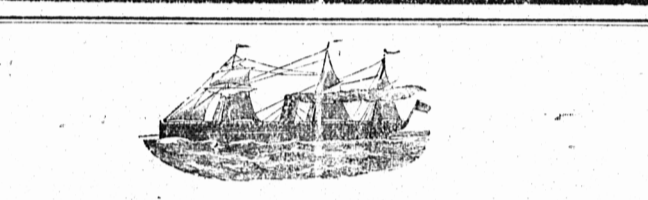
