Contract Bridge

THE EXTRA CHANCE

Today's declarer lost his slam contract by failing to exploit every chance.

North dealer
Both sides vulnerable

♠	A 10 7	♣	J 8 3 2
♥	A K Q 8	♦	7 5 4 3
♠	K J 2	♣	A 7 3
♥	Q 5 4	♦	10 9 8
♠	Q 9	♣	8 7 4
♥	A K Q 6 2	♦	Q 5 4

The bidding:
North East South West
1♥ Pass 2♣ Pass
3NT Pass 4♠ Pass
6♣ Pass Pass Pass

South's action in "disturbing" the three-notrump contract was in itself a slam invitation — and North cheerfully accepted the suggestion.

West opened the diamond ten. South won the trick in his own hand and led a low trump to dummy's ace. On the trump return, after East followed with the ten, declarer thought for a long time whether to finesse, but finally he chose to play the king. To his disappointment, the queen did not drop, and when three rounds of hearts revealed that East could stop the fourth round, declarer was thoroughly disgusted. A spade had to be conceded, for the slam's defeat.

It is a close point whether or not declarer should have finessed for the queen of clubs. The finesse might have succeeded where every other plan would fail. But on South's actual play of the ace and king of trumps the slam still could have been made. South should have seen that there was a good chance that hearts would not break, and that he would find no place for discard of his losing spade. As "insurance" against a bad heart break, he should have stripped the diamonds from the North-South hands and then led out the ace, king and queen of hearts. If the suit broke 3-3, the fourth heart would provide a discard; if it did not, whoever had the club queen he was so fortunate as to have the thirteenth diamond or heart, he would be forced to lead a spade. That would give South one more chance for his contract.

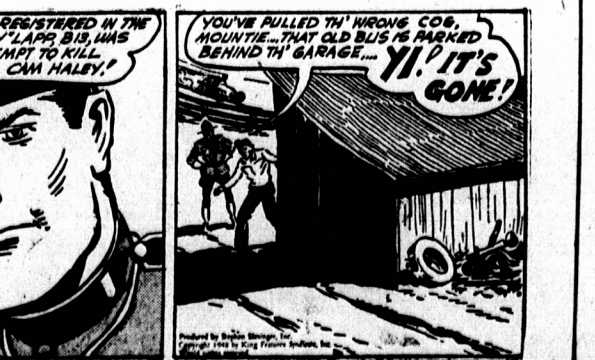
