Rev William McIntosh, pastor of the First Congregational church of Ottawa for the past fifteen years, died suddenly Saturday night. Acute indigestion was the cause of death. He was regarded as one of the most eloquent pulpit men of Ottawa and was prominent in all social reform movements.

In the evening the reverend gentleman preached an eloquent sermon in the Pownal church from the text, "Lead us not into temptation." The services in his church at Bedouque, Sunday were taken by Rev Mr Wightman, Montague, whose place in turn was filled by Rev Mr Styles of Pownal. Rev Mr Orman preached at Pownal, Sunday morning, Vernon River North, in the afternoon, and in his own church at Vernon River in the evening.
