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LEND-LEASE SHIPMENTS TO RUSSIA WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 (AP)—Lend-lease shipments to Russia from the United States include more than 3,200 tanks, almost 2,000 planes and 8,000 military vehicles, according to a report from the Lend-lease Administrator, Edward R. Steinhilber, said today, adding that these were not enough and that some were lost enroute.

The figures were as of Jan. 1, 1942. Steinhilber reported that important progress was made in 1942, that "Lend-lease aid to Russia is growing to a sizeable proportion" and "will grow still more in 1943."

Steinhilber said Lend-lease shipments of war supplies to Russia reached a new high in November exports being 13 times the total sent in January, 1942. Military items accounted for two-thirds of the value of November shipments, the balance being industrial materials for munitions factories and food.

He said the United Kingdom supplied Russia with "great quantities of military equipment" produced in Great Britain, that United Kingdom shipments to Russia included more than 2,600 tanks, and more than 2,000 planes.

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WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 (AP)—Experiences of scores of men who reached safety after their merchant vessels were torpedoed will aid other merchant seamen in saving their own lives. Lend-lease studies by the United States Coast guard, experiences and emergency measures taken by men drifting in lifeboats have been published in a life-saving primer "designed to help save seamen's lives if their ships are sunk."
