In Memoriam

THE LATE ABRAHAM BONNELL

On Wednesday of last week, Charlottetown lost one of its foremost citizens, Abraham Bonnell, who for the greater part of forty-six years served the people of this Province in the capacity of Supervisor of Falconwood Hospital passed away. The news of his death came as a great shock to his many friends throughout Prince Edward Island, as few had been aware of his illness.

In the year 1884 Mr. Bonnell took up his duties at Falconwood, and throughout all these years since by his patience, his kindness and his unflinching sympathy endeared himself to inmates and employees alike. Indeed he exercised a peculiar charm over the mentally afflicted to that oftentimes, by a quiet word or touch of the hand, as he passed through the wards Trinity Church of which he was a

he could calm the most violently distraught. And those employees who have been longest in the service of the Institution declare that they can recall only the happiest relationships with Mr. Bonnell during his tenure of office.

At the opening of the Hilary Term of the Supreme Court this year, His Lordship Chief Justice Matheson addressing the Grand Jury, paid a high tribute to the record of Mr. Bonnell. The Chief Justice declared that it would be difficult to find in the Province a more capable or efficient public servant. No man could calculate, he said, the value of Mr. Bonnell's unceasing service which he rendered for nearly half a century to the afflicted among our people. Mr. Justice Hazard warmly seconded. His Lordship's tribute and said that much of the improvement evident in the Falconwood Institutions today was due to the unceasing labors of this faithful Supervisor. The Grand Jury, too, in presenting its reports, after having visited Falconwood, paid its meed of praise to Mr. Bonnell for his long and faithful service.

On the occasion when Premier Saunders announced to the Legislative Assembly this spring that the Government had acceded to Mr. Bonnell's request for a pension and retirement from office, not only members of the Government, but also Mr. J. D. Stewart and other members of the Opposition vied with one another in paying tribute to his character and his worth.

Mr. Bonnell will be sorely missed in death.

Abraham Bonnell has gone, but the memory of his life of devoted and self-sacrifice will long linger with us and many hearts will be stronger and braver because he passed this way.
