

Bruins Tighten Grip To Third Place In N.H.L. With 6-2 Win Over N.Y.

NEW YORK, March 16 (AP)—Boston Bruins tightened their hold on third place in the National Hockey League tonight, drubbing New York Rangers 6-2 before 15,111 fans in Madison Square Garden.

Sparked by veteran Milt Schmidt, the Bruins' victory boosted their lead over the fourth place Rangers to three points but both teams have two games left in the last week of the league race. The Rangers need one point to make sure of a playoff berth. Canadiens have a mathematical chance of ousting them.

Frank Edolls suffered torn left leg ligaments in the third period and officials said he would not travel with the Rangers to Chicago tomorrow.

Sport Echoes from Prince County

We have just finished listening to the bulletins coming from the game at Bathurst between the Bathurst Papermakers and the Summerside All-Stars. The final score, as everybody will know by this time, was 9 to 5, and Bathurst won the round by the total score of 15 to 10. Once again the Papermakers got the jump on our boys in the first period scoring the first three goals. According to the summary which came over C.H.G.S. Bob Schurman and "Windy" Steele starred for the home team.

The All-Stars have nothing to be ashamed of. They went further than any Summerside team since 1939. That was the last year in which a Summerside sextet won the Island championship. Their victory over a very powerful Charlottetown team was in itself a surprising and gratifying achievement. The boys didn't seem to be at the peak of their play in the Bathurst games, but nevertheless made an interesting series of it.

All we have left on the hockey horizon, as far as we are concerned, is the completion of the Town League which threatens to remain uncompleted as the season is pretty well advanced, and the League has not yet reached the playoff stage, the interscholastic championship which Tignish won last year, and which Summerside High seems to have a pretty good chance to win this year, if for no other reason, and the bankam, pee-wee, and paperweight Island championships.

"Boo" Morrison got a goal and an assist in the game in which the Stellarton Royals defeated the Charlottetown Abegweits 7 to 6. If Boo could have been persuaded to remain in Summerside during the past winter he would have added quite a lot of power to our All-Stars, and it is possible we might then have been strong enough to win the Maritime championship.

Now that Summerside has demonstrated its ability to win Island baseball, hockey and curling championships, isn't it about time we entered the field of basketball? It seems strange for a town the size of Summerside not to have any facilities for such a popular game as basketball. We have some old basketball stars in our midst, Bruce Johnson to name one of them, and there seems little doubt that if the game were revived here it would create a great deal of interest, and in no time at all we should be giving Charlottetown something else to worry about. The securing of a suitable place to play the game has thus far been the chief stumbling block, but surely this hurdle could be got over if sufficient enthusiasm could be worked up for the game. The Kinsmen seem to be the prime movers in the support and encouragement of sports in our town. Perhaps they will come up with an idea that will result in the re-introduction of basketball in Summerside.

Sydney Millionaires Capture Maritime Hockey Championship

SYDNEY, N. S., March 16 (OP)—After an absence of seven years the Maritime senior hockey championship came back to Cape Breton tonight as Sydney's powerful Millionaires defeated the defending champions, Moncton Hawks, 4-1, to take the best-of-five final series 3-1.

Millionaires will meet Renfrew Lions here Saturday night in the first game of the Eastern Canada semi-finals.

Tonight the steel city squad were full value for their decisive victory. They gave their best offensive performance of the season as they skated the tired Hawks into submission.

Again the fighting Hawks dressed only 11 men for the contest against Sydney's 13. Jerry Gagnon, Millionaires' fleet winger and the League's leading scorer, was absent from the lineup through illness. His place was taken by ill-injured Bessie MacDonald.

Don Whalen, Saint John native, again led the Sydney attack with two goals.

How Eddie Shore Would Improve Hockey

MONTREAL, March 16—Eddie Shore, among the roughest, toughest of them all, said today that "the future of hockey lies in cutting out the illegal charging and the holding and the interference."

Shore now is a hockey magnate who owns clubs in the American and United States Leagues. Here in Montreal he talked hockey with Einar (Montreal Herald) Ferguson.

"I think we're playing better hockey, comparatively, in our American League than we're playing in the National League," said Shore. "Don't get me wrong, I don't mean in point of actual hockey class, in which we're a couple of strides behind. But I believe we're getting faster hockey, within our own scope, more open hockey, less ganging and holding, and less interference and other illegal forms of play than you have in the National League. There's less ganging and piling up inside the blue line because there's no holding and no interference with players carrying the puck out."

And how come this miracle? "There's no miracle about it. The answer is that we have two referees, with equal authority vested in both, and no alibis accepted."

Plans To Press For Explanation Of Replacements Issue

(By The Canadian Press)

MONTCTON, N. B., March 16—J. O'Brien, vice-president for New Brunswick of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association, charged today that an explanation of the "whole issue" of replacements for Moncton Hawks, champions of the Maritime Senior Hockey League, should be forthcoming.

"I, for one, am going to see that it is procured," he declared.

Hawks, trailing Sydney Millionaires, winners of the Cape Breton senior league, 2-1 in the Allan Cup playdowns for the Maritime championship, were refused replacement by the M.A.H.A. and will ice only 11 men at Sydney tonight.

Charles Campbell of Sydney, M.A.H.A. president, said he took a telegraphic vote yesterday on the matter of replacements for the Moncton team and the issue was defeated 3-2 by the executive.

He added that George Dudley, secretary of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, had advised him he was "on the right track and to stick to his guns."

Mr. O'Brien said there were five members of the M.A.H.A. with authority to vote and that only in case of a tie was there a necessity for the president to vote. He said he was sure there had been no tie on this occasion.

Two of the members of the Association had informed him by telephone that they were "in favor of replacements for the Hawks."

President Campbell said a second telegraphic vote taken last night had decided in favor of the Hawks. But, this was not sanctioned by him and was based on "evidence" given the executive by "Moncton interests" which had not been verified. He did not elaborate.

Western Germany In Marshall Plan

PARIS, March 16 (AP)—The Foreign Ministers of Western Europe bowed reluctantly today to division of Germany and voted to bring the three Western Occupation Zones into their plan for continental organization.

At the close of a two-day meeting the delegates from 16 Marshall Plan countries set up a working committee to draft a treaty for mutual economic aid to make themselves strong against Communism and a charter for a permanent European organization to carry out the pact.

Garden Will Not Back Taylor Appeal

NEW YORK, March 16 (CP)—Frank Boucher, manager of New York Rangers, said today that Madison Square Garden officials would not back any appeal made by Billy Taylor against his expulsion from hockey on charges of gambling in the National Hockey League.

Boucher said in an address yesterday before the New York Sports Broadcasters Association, that additional evidence in the recent H. L. betting scandal which also resulted in suspension of Don Gallinger of Boston Bruins would be made public shortly.

LONDON, March 16 (AP)—Randolph Turpin, a 19-year-old boxer, outpointed British middleweight champion Vince Hawkins at Harringay Arena tonight, but the youngster can't hold the title until he grows up. Turpin won't be allowed to fight over the regulation 15 rounds of a title contest until he is 21.

Redemptorists Send Missionaries To Japan

LONDON, Ont., March 16 (CP)—A London priest, Rev. James Fuller, Rector of St. Patrick's Church, has been chosen to lead a group of Catholic Redemptorist missionaries to Japan to replace those interned or forced to leave the country by the Japanese during World War Two, it was announced today.

The appointment was made by the Provincial of the English speaking Redemptorist Fathers of Canada, Rev. Daniel Ehman, C.S.S.R. of Toronto.

Names of other members of the group have not been released. Father Fuller is 55 years old and is a native of Quebec City. He was Provincial of the Order for more than 11 years.

He was formerly at St. Mary's College, Brockville and ministered in Montreal and Saint John, N.B.

Busy Evening Session Of House

In the course of a busy session last evening, the Legislature gave committee reading to a number of bills, including an amendment to the Silver Fox Breeders and Exhibitors Association Act, changing the name of the organization to the P. E. I. Fur Breeders Association; an Act authorizing the Roman Catholic Episcopal Corporation to guarantee bonds of the Charlottetown Hospital to the amount of \$500,000; an act to amend the Charlottetown Hospital Incorporation Act, to enable bonds to be payable outside the Province; the Public Vehicle Act, which brings the operation of buses under jurisdiction of the Motor Carrier Board; an Act to incorporate the P. E. I. Garage Operators Association; an Act to amend the Prince County Hospital Incorporation Act for the purpose of increasing borrowing power to \$500,000; an Act to incorporate the Crapaud Rink Company; an Act to amend the Highway Traffic Act.

Progress was reported on committee reading of the Steam Boiler Act.

At the afternoon session Premier Jones introduced by resolution an Act to amend the Public School Act for the purpose of providing for regional high schools.

Progress was reported on a bill to provide uniform legislation for the Towns of Prince Edward Island. This bill, a voluminous one, is being reviewed by a special committee who will report back to the House for the purpose of shortening discussion.

The House is scheduled to meet at 11 a.m. today. No reference to the Budget delivery was made yesterday by Premier Jones, who had previously stated that he expected to make it no later than Wednesday of this week.
