A letter received from Mr. Jeremiah S. Clark of the Ruperts Land Indian Industrial School, Middle Church, Man-it is learned that he began work on March 30th. When he arrived the position in the school was vacant. He says that everything is spring-like in Manitoba.

CAPT. DUNN, of Summerside is in the city fitting the schooner Lois and expects to sail for Pictou on Monday next where schooner will be loaded with coal for Summerside. After discharging her cargo at the latter port it is probable that the transfer of rails from Point du Chene to Summerside will be taken up. It will be remembered that last year Lois brought to the province over 1,000 tons of steel rails for the Prince Edward Island Railway.
