THE EXAMINER AND MR. MARTIN.

The Examiner has some further ill-natured comments upon our non-publication of Mr. Martin's letter. Does the Examiner recall the fact that Mr. Martin complained that it did not print "the evidence taken on the last day of the trial?" Also that Mr. Martin thanked the Summerside Journal, the Herald, the Watchman and THE GUARDIAN for "independent comments after the trial was over?" That his letter as it appeared in the Examiner, with some wide spaces between words in that particular paragraph, also included the Examiner in its thanks?

Just here we beg, most courteously, to ask of the Examiner whether the paragraph in question appeared in print in the form and words in which it was first submitted for publication? Of course the Examiner is not obliged to answer. But in its zeal to make public what took place between Mr. Martin and THE GUARDIAN it may be well to remember that a large proportion of the reading public are much more desirous to learn what took place between Mr. Martin and the Examiner in regard to the same letter.

So far as this journal is concerned we are bound to think that Mr. Martin's thanks to us were a purely spontaneous offering, made because he believed the thanks were justly due. We did not ask for thanks nor in any way intimate that we expected thanks. As a matter of fact we did not expect them. Did the thanks come to the Examiner in the same unsought and spontaneous fashion—actually thrust upon our contemporary, so to speak, without the editor's previous knowledge or consent?

This journal was not the first to raise the question of the relations of Mr. Martin, or other public men with the press. But we are willing to discuss it right down to bottom facts if the Examiner will be as frank as THE GUARDIAN has already been in disclosing what actually took place. We await a reply.

Referring to the matter of the better care of the poor in Charlottetown, which has been discussed in the daily papers, it may be mentioned that the subject is still occupying attention. One of our city clergymen who takes a deep interest in the poor, yesterday had a conversation with Premier Farquharson who expressed the opinion that the present methods of caring for the poor might be improved and that the proposed public meeting might do good. Correspondence is also going on with other cities with a view to learn more of the management, support and methods of associated charities there. When sufficient information is collected a public meeting will be called.

Just now the Conservative papers are printing the names of Liberal papers which receive sums ranging from \$2,000 to \$25,000 each for government printing and advertising. A few years ago it was the Liberal papers which denounced the subsidised press of the other side. We see little difference in the amount or the justice of these payments. Large payments in most cases mean a large amount of work actually performed, with no doubt a margin of profit. It is one of those matters in which the "outs" are always criticising the "ins" and in which the "ins" do not very greatly relish the discussion. They feel like saying with Hosea Biglow—
 Withered be the nose that pokes
 Into the Government printing.
