A recent survey shows that "buyers resistance" and the gastronomic prejudice of home-fod natives have capitulated to a tickled palate. Japan and China smack their lips over steaming corned beef hash and canned sausage. India is growing sturdy on Columbia river salmon and California fruit. Brazil keeps the American market swamped with demands for canned asparagus.

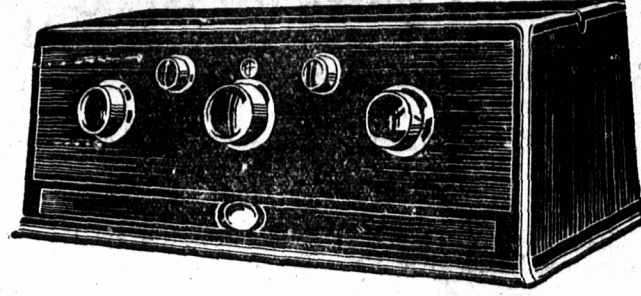
Tariff Walls Scaled

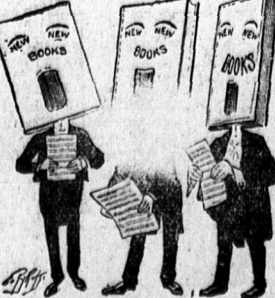
