### SPORTING NEWS BASKET BALL

On Saturday evening, there was witnessed by a large number of spectators, one of the fastest and most strenuous games of basket ball ever played on the "Old Gym" floor, when the P. W. C. boys were defeated by the Y. M. C. A. boys by the small margin of 3 points; the score at the end of the game being 17 to 20 in favour of the Y. M. C. A. boys. The game was a fast one throughout. The P. W. C. boys held their adversaries down well; but the Y. M. C. A. boys were determined to win from their hard-fighting opponents who were as anxious to secure victory as the former. Fred Donald, of the P. W. C. team, scored 13 points for his team; Harry Boats scored 2, J. Koughan, 2, E. Ings and Chas. Rattoe, who are both fast men, failed to connect with the basket. For the Y. M. C. A. team, Ken Martin, who was the star player on the P. W. C. team last season, scored 10 points; Ted Moore, 6 points; A. Searvan played a very fast game and secured 4 points. W. H. Dowar and Wallace Scantlebury, who played in the position of guards, made a fine showing throughout the game. The next game will take place on Thursday evening, when the P. W. C. will play the U. C. C.

### CURLING

The new curling rink was opened with much enthusiasm last night; President James B. Paton and Vice-President Col. H. M. Davison throwing the first stone and also skipping into first game. The game was closely contested and resulted in a win for Mr. Paton's rink by a margin. The second game was skipped by Dr. Pethick and Professor Robertson and also resulted in a close finish, slightly in favour of the latter. The third game was skipped by Mr. Grant and Mr. Beer. Among those present, in addition to the above, were Messrs. C. H. Black, C. Morris, D. A. Wedlock, A. Hyman, R. Pethick, J. O. Hyndman, Sidner, Grey and Roy Holman. There was a goodly number of spectators including several ladies. All were delighted with the new rink and its appointments, and especially delighted with the rollicking enthusiasm with which the players entered into the spirit of the rogan game. The ice was in splendid shape and will be even better tonight.

### MORALS OF ST. JOHN SUBJECT OF LECTURE.

ST. JOHN, Jan. 16.—Moral conditions in St. John, was the subject of an interesting lecture in St. Luke's Church, last evening, by Adjutant Cummings of the Salvation Army, before a large audience of men.

Treating his subject comprehensively, the speaker first touched upon the housing conditions in the city, then dealt with the liquor question in the city. Delinquent girls were also discussed.

Speaking of local housing conditions Adjutant Cummings strongly disapproved of the flat system largely in use in the city and said that this manner of living was found to be a danger to the morality of the family. The family business, he said, cannot be kept sacred while the flat system is in use, and the time is coming when the working men in St. John will have their self-contained house with healthy surroundings.

Touching on the temperance question, the speaker said that it was within the power of the church to control the liquor traffic. If the members of the church follow the teachings of their ministers, he said, they can succeed in stamping out the evil.

The girl problem was then dealt with, and Adjutant Cummings told of some cases of extreme delinquency which came under his personal notice and told of the assistance and co-operation needed to uplift and strengthen the morals of the girls.

### ANNUAL MEETING ST. JAMES'S CHURCH

Under the presidency of Col. D. Stewart, the annual meeting of St. James's Church was held last night, and was well attended. Mr. D. A. McKinnon acted as Secretary. Yesterday was the twenty-fifth anniversary of the induction of the Rev. Dr. Fullerton to the pastorate of the Church, and the fact was appropriately referred to at the meeting.

The finances of the church were reported to be of unprecedentedly healthy condition.

The summary of the receipts and expenditure for the year that was submitted showed under the frugal-headed total amount to have been \$3,923.11, the principal items in which were: Envelopes, \$3,174.70 and open collection, \$596.33. Expenditure totaled \$3,920.73, leaving a credit balance of \$2.38. The estimates for 1914 were also presented and showed that it is expected to receive from envelopes, \$3,800, from open collection, \$600, and from the Ladies' Aid Society, \$275, with other items making the total estimated revenue for this year \$4,252.88. Among the estimated expenditure, the total of which is put down at \$4,125.80, is a sum of \$275 for improvements in the basement of the hall, to render this more commodious than at present; also \$300 for repairs to the church and manse; \$126.55 being reserved to meet contingencies.

A resolution was adopted which has as its object the granting of a month's furlough each year to the pastor. The retiring Board of Trustees was re-elected and votes of thanks were accorded the different societies of the church for the good work they had done during the past year.

A resolution was also passed regretting the absence through illness of two of the oldest Elders of the church, Mr. T. C. James and Mr. John McInnis.

### MAN DIED TWICE.

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—Edward McCarroll, who worked on the Harlem River, was pronounced dead yesterday afternoon within fifteen minutes.

Attorney Whitson of the East 126th street station found McCarroll, who was 45 years old and who won a Congressional medal for saving several women and children in the Gen. Slocum disaster, lying on the sidewalk at 127th street and Third avenue, apparently dead. Dr. Frank Roohan came with a Harlem Hospital ambulance, examined the man and said he had been dead for several minutes.

The body was taken to the station house. Inside McCarroll showed signs of life. Dr. Roohan put an ammonia bottle on his nose and he sat up with the remark: "What's going on here?" Then he fell back in a faint.

The ambulance made a dash for the hospital and McCarroll was hurried to an operating table, where several physicians set to work on him. He did not revive this time. The physicians said it was a rare case of suspended animation. Heart disease was the cause of death.

### ASSIGNMENT OF WOODSTOCK COMPANY.

WOODSTOCK, Jan. 17.—Messrs. Connell Bros. Ltd., have made an assignment to Mr. Wm. S. Sutton, of Woodstock. A meeting of creditors will be held on January 26th for the appointment of inspectors, etc. As the unencumbered estate is valued at \$30,000, with book debts of \$20,000 and with liabilities of only \$15,000, it is felt that the old established laundry company will be at work again in a short time.

### IN MEMORIAM

MISS MARY McLEOD.

On the evening of January 11th, 1914, there passed peacefully away at her home in Montague, Miss Mary McLeod, who died a number of years ago and also of the late John R. who only predeceased her by a few months.

For a number of years the deceased lady has been confined to the house and has been ministered to by the loving hands of her sister, Catherine R. and her cousin Mary. In her younger days she was a woman of considerable ability and of prepossessing appearance. Some short time ago, she suffered a shock of paralysis and came quietly. The interment took place at Uigg where all that was mortal was laid to rest at the place of her childhood. The only surviving member of the family is Catherine R. of Montague who has the sympathy and the prayers of her friends during this period of a double bereavement.

### SLIMMER WOMEN ARE CRITICISED

BATTLE CREEK, MICH., Jan. 19. Two hundred men and women, prominent in scientific and educational fields, opened a five days' session of the National Conference on Race Betterment. They say their aim will be to strive to bring humanity to ultimate physical and mental perfection through eugenics chiefly and ethically incidentally.

The conference will be made an annual affair under the direction of an executive committee, which will probably include the Rev. Newell Dwight Hillis, Prof. Irving Fisher, Dr. C. B. Davenport, of Cold Spring Harbor, N. Y., Dr. Victor C. Vaughan, president of the American Medical Association, and Dr. J. H. Kellogg of Battle Creek, the host of initial meeting.

At the opening session, Dr. Stephen Smith, vice-president of the New York State Board of Charities and president of the conference, was the first speaker. Despite his advanced age of ninety-two, he reads typewritten manuscript of forty-three pages without the least evidence of fatigue. He said that it civilized man behaved himself, went to bed nights, ate and drank temperately, he should live to be an even hundred years of age. That point seemed to indicate to Dr. Smith that humanity is somewhat the worse for wear.

Dr. Richard Root Smith, Grand Rapids, described the best physical type. She is the compactly built woman who has a deep chest, steady nerves and enough flesh to stand out in the anatomical angles. The woman slender and thin, so favored by fashion nowadays is not the perfect type, but a defective variety. Such deficiencies exist not because of any modern fad of fashion, or of diet, or of diversion, but because they existed in the progenitors. The only time to correct faults, the speaker said, is in childhood or before.

H. H. Laughlin of the Cold Spring Harbor eugenics office discussed sterilization as a means of preventing the reproduction of the criminal and degenerate type. The remedy, he said, is humane and will in time, become generally practiced.

### LADY CURZON'S DOWER GROWS TO BIG PILE.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 17.—The net sum of \$1,543,160 is to be turned over to the new trustees of the fund created by the late Lord Z. Curzon, of Chicago and Washington, as a marriage dowry for his daughter, Mary V. Curzon, when she becomes Lady Curzon, according to a report of the account by the district supreme court. The income on the total settlement, since the marriage in April, 1895, to December 22 last is shown to have aggregated \$903,316.

The accounting was made necessary by the resignation of the original trustees and the substitution in their places of two others. The original marriage settlement was \$700,000 and when Lady Curzon's father died the fund was increased by an additional cash payment of \$1,000,000. Payments have been made to the beneficiaries as follows: To Mary V. Curzon, before her death, \$394,250; to George Nathaniel, Earl Curzon, \$162,210, and to the Earl as guardian for his children, \$320,294.
