At St. Dunstan's Cathedral yesterday afternoon the usual children's May day service took place. There was a procession around the church, and an address was delivered by Rev. John B. McIntyre.

Mr. Klark in his farewell speech intimated, amid applause that he would probably come again before the year ran out.

At the City Police Court on Saturday morning Mrs. Mary Ann McInnis appeared charged with keeping a house of ill-repute on Euston Street. The prosecution was brought by City Marshal Cameron, who has had the place under surveillance for some time. The court room was crowded with spectators. Although the proprietress of the house did not appear in court her two daughters, both under 20 years of age were present and with a number of men who frequented the house gave testimony before the Court. The evidence adduced showed that a disgraceful condition of affairs has been existing for some time. The house has been visited by young men and men of middle age, some of them married. They have been in the habit of bringing liquor to the house and drinking it there and behaving in a disorderly manner. The Magistrate fined Mrs. McInnis \$50, or 90 days imprisonment and warned the frequenters of the place that they also were liable to prosecution. Johnathan Marshall, Brantford, Ont., aged 57, a well-known and popular man throughout the district, was almost instantly killed at the power house of the Western Counties Electric Company on April 25th. During the earlier part of the afternoon the storm which prevailed then, damaged a part of the galvanized iron roof and a portion of it was hanging downwards coming in contact with one of the many live wires around. Mr. Marshall and another man were repairing the roof when the former happened to place his foot on one of the live wires and at the same time rested his hand on the galvanized iron completing the circuit. The man then fell thirty feet through space, lighting on the left side of his head on the solid cement floor below. He died about two minutes afterwards. Dr. Blackwell of Cainsville, was summoned but life was extinct on his arrival. The late Mr. Marshall was born in 1851 at Niagara-on-the-Lake. He was married in 1877 at Port Dalhousie. He followed the trade of a ship carpenter for some years, working for Edward Andrews at Port Dalhousie. He then went in for bridge building, coming to Brantford, taking a position in this city. He was one of the men who constructed the new span of Lorne Bridge. He left Brantford and went to Charlottetown, where he was employed on the construction of the Hillsborough bridge over the East River from the City of Charlottetown to Southport. When that work was concluded he returned to Brantford and took the position he held before his sad and sudden demise. Besides a grief-stricken wife the late Mr. Marshall left four sons, Henry, of the Robert Reid furniture establishment; John W. G., and Samuel, both employed by the Gutta Percha Rubber Company, Toronto and Charles, aged 15 years at the home; three daughters, Mrs. John Sim, Mrs. W. Knowles and Mrs. H. Roberts, all of Brantford; two brothers, Henry, of Cleveland, and Richard, of Port Dalhousie; two sisters, Ida and Jennet, of Cleveland; Mrs. Samuel Marshall, a daughter-in-law, is the daughter of Joseph and Mrs. Corney of this City.
